A Personal and Active Faith in God


Criteria for Goal One:

- 1. The school recognises the life force in the love of Jesus Christ in supporting in concrete ways the value of reflection and of prayer.
- 2. Within the total educational programme, the school provides opportunities for celebrating the Eucharist and other Sacraments, and provides a range of special interest groups for faith exploration.
- 3. The total educational programme affirms the belief that there is meaning in life and thereby fosters within the school community a sense of hope.
- 4. The religious studies programme probes the relationship of God to people and to the world, and is given priority in the school.
- 5. The school provides education to decision-making in the light of the Gospel.
- 6. The school presents itself to the wider community as a school in the Roman Catholic tradition within the evolving Christian Church.
- 7. Discussion of religious values, issues and ideas is characterised by openness and tolerance.

Criteria for Goal Two:

- 1. The school encourages serious study resulting in a love of learning for its own sake.
- 2. The development of curriculum based on recent research, on-going evaluation and realistic assessment.
- 3. A curriculum that encourages the development of aesthetic values and the creative use of imagination.
- 4. Providing opportunities and encouraging responsibility for learning through experiential education, including the element of reflection.
- 5. Teaching/learning styles which promote the development of individual students who are informed, critical and sensitive.

- 1. Communication and group skills are taught and opportunities to exercise those skills are provided.
- 2. School policies and practices are established and reviewed in the light of Christian principles.

- 4. Effort is made to include in the school community, students from varied socio-economic backgrounds.
