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Gill Chappell, Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, is proud to share highlights from our recent Special Character Review Report.

At Baradene, we strive to integrate the school's special character and charism into the teaching curriculum and embed it as the ethos of our school community. The College's endeavours to achieve this goal, and its success in doing so, were recently recognised by the Catholic Special Character Review, which is undertaken every three years by Catholic Education Services. The Review's authors visited the College for three days in May, attending classes and interviewing key stakeholders including staff, board members, students, and parents. I am very proud to share some of their findings:

- "The College's quality teaching and leadership with a special character lens integrates different aspects of human knowledge through the subjects taught and the wider life of the school, in the light of the Gospel."
- "There is a clear, shared understanding of Catholic spirituality that is articulated and shared. The faith-based leadership and witness of the Principal, Senior Leadership Team, Director of Mission, and Head of Faculty RE are evident in all they do."
- "The classroom environments are very settled, with respectful relationships where the students are well known, happy, and engaged. They appreciate the love and care of their teachers. Student voice is regularly sought."
- "Warm, respectful relationships are evident throughout the school and Special Catholic Character permeates everything."

On behalf of the Board, I wish to thank all those who participated in the Review, and our staff and students for the way in which they embrace the special character teaching opportunities.

As Religious Education is the subject providing a direct opportunity to reflect on religion, I recommend that for some interesting and wide-ranging discussions at home, you ask your daughter about the topics discussed in those classes. You may discover, as I have as a parent and as did the reviewers of the Catholic Special Character Review, that students believe the spiritual aspect of their education helps them to be well-rounded individuals with a deeper understanding of religion's place and impact in the world. I constantly appreciate the sophisticated level of debate this subject offers and how enthusiastically students engage with it.

As the concepts of mental health and wellbeing take on increasing importance, the value of religious education is perfectly summed up in the proverb "Mauri tū mauri ora" – an active soul is a healthy soul.

We feel very fortunate to have been able to hold many special community events before the latest COVID-19 restrictions were imposed in August. We held Mass for St Madeleine Sophie's Feast Day followed by our special FOSH concert; our Year 13s enjoyed their School Ball; we welcomed grandparents into the school for the Feast of the Assumption; and we had a full school auditorium over several days and nights for sold-out performances of our successful production *Legally Blonde*.

Those large community events seem like a dream now, as we come to terms with the arrival of the Delta variant of COVID-19 in New Zealand and the ensuing restrictions. Once more I am thankful for the efforts of our teachers, parents and caregivers who have assisted our students with online learning from home. While we have become adept at this new way of learning, I am mindful that it places an extra burden on staff and families and am grateful for the efforts of all involved during this stressful time.

In light of this, it was pleasing to learn recently that despite the disruption to schooling last year, an independent researcher has collated the results for University Entrance percentage pass rates in 2020 and found Baradene was the top school in the country, with 97.7% of our students obtaining UE. Congratulations to our staff and students on this fantastic achievement.

Catholic Special Character Review

Board of Trustees Chairperson Gill Chappell has referred to the very positive Catholic Special Character Review in her letter on page 1. These external reviews evaluate the efficacy of our teaching of Religious Education and are an important measure of how well we are doing to engage and connect our students with their Catholic faith, and to strengthen and develop our Catholic culture.

It is also a reminder that it is our Catholic character that

sets us apart from other schools and gives us a different lens with which to view the world: That of our faith. Faith is at the centre of our school life, and I believe it has a very positive impact on student wellbeing.

The years spent at Baradene provide an important opportunity for our young women to pursue their individual potential, nourish their faith, and leave ready to thrive in a world filled with hope, purpose and meaning.

The report made particular mention of the many opportunities for prayer, reflection, and contemplation that students and staff are given at Baradene, and these are an important part of the daily rhythm of our life at school.

As the Catholic Special Character Review found, "Faith in Action is firmly embedded into the way things are done at Baradene College. Charity, service, and outreach are part of the day-to-day life of the school and students are well grounded in Catholic Social teachings."

There is also a growing emphasis on Religious Education as an academic subject, and it is one in which our students excel, achieving high levels of Merit and Excellence passes and, last year, nine students received NCEA Scholarship passes in the subject.



The Catholic Special Character Review team spoke in very positive terms about our school culture, noting that, "Warm, respectful relationships are evident throughout the school and Special Catholic Character permeates everything. Staff feel supported and described the kind,

collegial nature [of their relationships] towards one another. Parents are very positive about the way their daughters are educated. There is a sense of shared purpose and belonging and many spoke of their love for the school."

The Review team also joined the school in the Mass to celebrate St Madeleine's Sophie's Feast Day, which they described in their report as "a beautiful community celebration."

Wellbeing

Faith and wellbeing go hand in hand at Baradene and, as the Review noted, "There is a strong culture of wellbeing at Baradene College that aims to support students to thrive with their spirituality, learning, and wellbeing."

Mention was made of our pastoral care plan of Manaakitanga, which "embodies the ideas of reciprocal caring for others and the environment, showing kindness and hospitality, treating people with respect, and establishing nurturing relationships and relating to all members of the school community."

This concept is important to us as, from the earliest days of the Society of the Sacred Heart, diversity has been cherished. We value the richness of Aotearoa's bicultural society and we welcome students from many different backgrounds. Our international students come from all over the world.

Arts and Sports

One of the ways we build student wellbeing, confidence, and resilience is by giving our students the opportunity to take part in extra-curricular activities in the Arts and Sports.

We were very pleased by the excellent results obtained by our musicians in the KBB Music Festival, the Auckland Secondary Schools Music Competition. The Baradene Concert Band and the Combined St Peter's and Baradene Symphony Orchestra were both awarded Gold.

Both our Premier Basketball and our First XI Football teams made the Auckland finals. Our Premier Netball team was named the winner of the Auckland Premier 1 Netball Grade. At the National Championships Baradene was named as the Top Girls' School in orienteering, and 3rd Top Girls' School in swimming. Baradene cyclists were named the Top Girls' School at the North Island Championships.

We believe these recent sporting successes come from having good systems and support within the school, alongside great coaches and managers. But they also come from having a very high number of our students involved in sports, as all students can play no matter their ability. Taking part in extra-curricular activities also encourages authentic social connections away from the influence of social media.

It is when we are forced to spend time away from school, as we have been in recent months, that we have the opportunity to reflect on just how much we all gain from being part of the community at Baradene: A community that has faith that better days will come.


RSCJ UPDATE RSCJ NEWS

Sister Barbara Crombie RSCJ of the Baradene Convent celebrated her 100th birthday on 10 September 2021, and reflects on her interesting life.

On my Baptismal Certificate from St Mary of the Angels Church in Wellington, New Zealand, the date is September 18, 1921 and residence is given simply as "The Terrace". Born on 10 September, I spent 19 years in Wellington. I was a day pupil of St Mary's College until I left during wartime to enter our Noviceship at Rose Bay, Sydney.

After my First Vows in September 1943, I joined a pioneer group in the new foundation of Kerever Park, a junior Boarding School – wonderful sharing of wartime conditions in the Southern Highlands of NSW. Before I went to the Probation in Rome in the Holy Year of 1950, I had the joy-filled experience of two years teaching at Baradene as a happy prelude to my Final Vows.

To cover the years after this, there are three clear divisions: Twenty years teaching in New South Wales and Victoria, then a graced time of teaching in New Zealand under the more relaxed regimes of post-Vatican II, and then 20 years of Ashram life in India. This was again a pioneering time: The foundation of Jeevan Dhara Ashram, Jaiharikal, 7,500 ft up in the Himalayas. This was a unique experience as I was the disciple of Vandana Mataji who had formerly been our Provincial in India. In 1999, we handed over our Ashram to the Carmelites of Mary Immaculate, and I have since had a wonderfully blessed retirement time here at Baradene.

In Memoriam

Patricia Horsley, AMASC President

Patricia was born in 1930, and from 1941 Patricia and her sister Mary attended Rose

Bay, following the family tradition; their mother and aunts having attended Kincoppal and Rose Bay. Patricia graduated in 1947 and then studied Architecture at the University of Sydney. During that time she lived at Sancta Sophia College, run by the Society of the Sacred Heart, until she graduated in 1954. She was subsequently on the Council of Sancta for 41 years. While President of AMASC (World Association of Alumnae of the Sacred Heart) Patricia took every opportunity to visit NZ and participate in RSCJ celebrations, especially those at Baradene. The Chapel Society at Rose Bay became a major interest, combining her love for her school and architecture and, appropriately, her memorial service was held in the beautiful Chapel. Patricia had the gift of friendship in abundance and lived her life fully in the Sacre Coeur tradition.

Sister Mary d'Apice RSCJ AM

Sister d'Apice was an Australian who spent time working from Baradene in the 1970s, largely outside the school. Mary was educated at Rose Bay following family tradition. She studied Medicine at the University of Sydney and graduated before entering the Society of the Sacred Heart. She taught in a number of schools and became Mistress General at Rose Bay from 1958-66 and, later, Reverend Mother. Sister d'Apice trained in the USA as a counsellor and Spiritual Director, and in Auckland and Sydney her ministry was in working with Religious from many orders. Her 1989 book Noon to Nightfall explored the journey through midlife and ageing and became very popular. Sister d'Apice became a Member of the Australian Order of Merit in 2018. She died on Boxing Day 2020 at the age of 98.



La Fete may have looked a bit different this year, but our students made the event an enjoyable success.

This year's Feast of the Sacred Heart was held on Friday, 11 June. The day started with Mass, followed by La Fete (Fair) and a concert. As last year's La Fete was cancelled due to COVID-19, we were all delighted to be able to have the event go ahead this year, albeit with some differences. In previous years, home baking was provided by students for La Fete, with the proceeds going towards the SHIFT Foundation to continue their important work. Instead, we brought in food trucks, and moved donations online. With over \$7,000 raised, this year's fundraising campaign was a great success.

Sacred Heart Institute for Transformative Education (SHIFT) Foundation

Proceeds raised from FOSH celebrations go to Sister Lydia Collado RSCJ at SHIFT (bit.ly/3z562nE), supporting the work of the Society of the Sacred Heart in Northern Samar. Since COVID-19 became a reality, the SHIFT community has focussed on Sophie's Farm, an initiative that grows crops for food, hosts training seminars for animal health and management, and demonstrates productive farming techniques. This work builds the capability of the local people to provide for themselves and create surplus for sale.




































Practical hours spent working with others gives our students the chance to see firsthand the many organisations who support and encourage their local communities, explains Catherine Everitt, Director of Mission.



St Madeleine Sophie Barat said that "to influence our world, we must understand it." The College overview of Justice, Peace, and the Integrity of Creation seeks not only to see our students involved in the practicalities of supporting others, but also inviting them to address the often-uncomfortable question of how such circumstances came to be. Programmes and

initiatives are subsequently designed to enhance the academic, practical, and reflective dimensions of considering any issue of social justice.

The work of the Church in the areas of Justice and Peace, the shared intentions of Pope Francis and the global Church, and an appreciation of Principles of Catholic Social Teaching shape our school-wide experience.

Students in Year 12 are asked to identify an opportunity to undertake 30 hours of service, with a comprehensive reflection during the process. This is not organised for them – they must liaise and work with an organisation or individual who has agreed to work with them, with the guidance of a personal mentor.

The opportunity for self-understanding and the capacity for service and compassionate action is heartening to witness. Here, two of our Year 12 students reflect on what they learned from their Social Services volunteer experiences.

Mikaela Campo, Year 12

For the Social Services programme, I spent my time volunteering at Manukau Library. Although I was apprehensive at first, the atmosphere was wonderful, and I formed great relationships with the staff, who guided me to learn valuable skills I wouldn't have otherwise had the opportunity to learn.

My time volunteering there gave me confidence and helped me develop my leadership skills when I was put in charge of Activities Day during the holidays. Prior to this experience, I had little confidence in myself; however, successfully supervising the children as well as enjoying my time with them made me realise the importance of stepping out of your comfort zone.

Additionally, I spent some time assisting customers and shelving books. This allowed me to learn patience and how libraries serve a variety of purposes. I've seen university students studying, younger kids having fun, and people reconnecting with their culture. Libraries provide a safe place in the community for relaxation, learning, and personal growth.



SOCIAL SERVICES

I volunteered at the Dove Hospice Shop in Remuera as part of my Social Services hours. Dove Hospice has multiple retail stores across the country that sell pre-loved, high-quality items. Profits from the stores are used to support people with life-threatening illnesses and their families.

Being afflicted with a life-threatening illness, or caring for someone who is, takes a significant toll. Dove Hospice is a charitable trust that aids those in need of support. As well as stores, Dove Hospice provides counselling sessions, respite care, and other services that ease stress and worry for people affected by life-threatening illnesses.



Volunteering at Dove Hospice was a very memorable part of my year as I learned a lot of useful skills such as merchandising, how to deal and interact with customers, as well as being organised. During my time at the store, I learned a lot from the people I worked with. They were friendly, helpful, and had a lot of experience with the various skills needed to run a store.

Working at Dove Hospice also provided me with a lot of opportunities with regard to my own career,

as I would like to work in the apparel industry. The manager allowed me to style and dress the mannequins.

Dove Hospice was a perfect place for me to volunteer and I highly recommend it to others because you can develop skills that you can apply to future jobs while also supporting a wonderful cause.

Year 7 and 8 students turned their annual cross-country race into a "Kilometres for KidsCan" fundraiser earlier this year, and they raised \$16,334.45 for Kiwi kids in need! Kilometres for KidsCan offers prizes to every child who raises over \$10 – the more money raised, the better the prize.

In addition to raising funds, our girls also donated their prizes to a KidsCan partner school, the first time this has happened

in New Zealand. Kidscan NZ was blown away by this act of generosity and kindness, which reflected our school's social justice model and displayed the kind spirit of Cor Unum.

Carol Adamson (Director of Year 7 and 8) took three school vans full of students to St Joseph's Catholic School, Grey Lynn, to distribute prizes. In the process of giving, our girls witnessed the joy that others felt and how much it meant to them. It was particularly emotional for everyone and humbling to see how our students felt, knowing that they had made such a positive impact on others.



They also participated in a guided tour led by Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei that showcased their sustainability initiatives, including their nursery and māra kai (food gardens). It was an experience that the students were grateful for as it allowed them to connect with the local community, which included several knowledgeable individuals.

The team looks forward to Sustainability Week each year. Students explored different aspects of sustainability over the course of the week. They hope that people were able to learn about sustainability and grow as a result of the week.

Soon, the Sustainability Team intends to draft a composting proposal to advocate for responsibly disposing of food waste produced at Baradene via a commercial composting company and organise an annual beach clean-up.



Now in our third year of having the wonderful turf facility on site at Baradene, hockey is reaping the benefits.

Our participation rates have increased consistently over the past few years and in 2021 we had 13 teams – the most teams Baradene has had for many years, if ever. It is now our second largest code participation-wise, with 180 girls playing for Baradene. We see this as a direct result of the convenience of training and playing games at home and the ability to run pre-season "give it a go" sessions. It has been fantastic to host games every Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday mornings, and we have exciting plans to make even more use of the turf in the off-season (holding in-house competitions, skill sessions etc). Baradene is also fortunate to have high-calibre coaches throughout all age grades, and it is great to see so many students coaching our younger teams.

Ist XI Hockey

Unfortunately, the Federation Cup was cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to COVID-19. At the last Federation Cup tournament in 2019, our 1st XI team placed 12th, the highest ranking Baradene has ever secured at this event. They have also consistently qualified for the Super 6 competition in Auckland.

Year 7/8 A Hockey

This team has had a great season. They were undefeated at the Eastern Zones tournament, qualifying for Inter Zones. At this tournament they won their pool, had a stellar semi-final against Holy Cross, but were just pipped in the final, 1-0 by Mahurangi.

Growing Heart has been supporting Baradene for five years. Here is an opportunity to look back.

Much of Baradene's success over its long history can be attributed to its caring, generous, and supportive community of past and present RSCJ Sisters, staff, students, alumnae and parents.

This has been particularly apparent over the last 18 months of COVID-19 lockdowns and restrictions. During this time, the dedication of our teaching and senior leadership staff, combined with the support of families and caregivers, has seen Baradene distinguish itself by continuing to deliver an outstanding education to our students, seamlessly transitioning from in-classroom to remote online learning.

Baradene's Foundation, known as Growing Heart, was set up in 2016 to channel financial support provided by the community, enabling it to make a very real and positive difference to the educational experience of our Baradene students, now and into the future.

Five years on, Growing Heart is an established presence in our community, supporting Baradene by providing funding for resources and initiatives to benefit students and staff, which would not otherwise be able to be funded by the government or from parent contributions.

Growing Heart demonstrates what makes our Baradene community so special, highlighting what can be achieved if we all play our part, aiming to leave Baradene in a stronger place than when we arrived, thus continuing the more than 110-year legacy of a caring and generous community working together to ensure the best for our students.

Much has been achieved in five years and, as a community, we should feel justifiably proud. To date, Growing Heart has paid or committed approximately \$140,000 in grants for the benefit of students, including:

- An electronic scoreboard, signage, and other equipment for the new hockey turf;
- For students to attend United Nations conferences and RSCJ conferences; and
- For students of families affected by the economic impact of COVID-19.

In addition, Growing Heart has established and administers student scholarships with a total value of over \$240,000, including:

- A new Growing Heart Scholarship, providing a deserving student with the opportunity to obtain the benefit of a Baradene education, commencing in 2022;
- The Erskine Barnao Fund Scholarship, each year providing an aspirational Year 13 student with a grant of \$3,000 to assist her with the costs of her NZ university course;
- The Deirdre McKay Piano Award, each year providing a talented Year 11 piano student with \$1,000 toward the cost of her piano tuition; and
- Hugo Charitable Trust Education Scholarships, which provide two current Baradene students with a fully paid Baradene College education.

We acknowledge and thank our Baradene community – the parents, alumnae, and friends of Growing Heart who have so generously made donations, pledges, and bequests over the last five years and who share a philosophy of "giving back". Without your generous support, we would not have been able to provide these benefits.

A word about bequests

Growing Heart has been fortunate to receive very generous bequests from alumnae who valued their Sacred Heart education and want to pass that benefit on to others. These bequests assist future generations of Baradene students to achieve their potential, while also highlighting that support can be provided in many forms. Some alumnae are not in a position to support Baradene now but may wish to do so in the future. We are working on a Bequests programme to ensure these type of gifts are made as easy as possible.

TaxGift Initiative

Baradene, in partnership with TaxGift, will launch this initiative in this 2021/22 financial year, enabling families to donate their tax credits on Baradene College Limited (BCL) Parent Financial Contributions back to Baradene. The credits returned to Baradene will be used to provide such things as Student Scholarships and the additional College facilities and resources which are not able to be funded by the Ministry of Education or parent contributions. LAURA O'GORMAN QC (Dux, Class of 1990)

Laura O'Gorman was made a Queen's Counsel in the latest round of appointments, announced in June this year. She follows a strong tradition of Baradene alumnae who have excelled in the law. A student at Baradene for Years 7 to 13, Laura has fond memories of sports days, school camps on Motutapu Island, the school tramp in the Waitakere ranges, debating, and playing sports including tennis, football, badminton, and basketball. In her senior years at Baradene, Laura focussed on German and French, mathematics, and accounting. Laura particularly remembers Sister Snedden and Mrs Crosswell, who stimulated her passion for foreign languages.

After Baradene, Laura studied for conjoint Law and Commerce degrees at The University of Auckland. In 1999, Laura obtained an LLM from the University of Cambridge. While there, she also rowed for her college, Peterhouse, and played bridge for the University.

Laura has specialised in commercial litigation and insolvency law. Her most interesting cases have included working on large insolvency matters including Feltex, Solid Energy, and Five Star Consumer Finance; acting for the Electricity Commission and Electricity Authority in numerous appeals and judicial reviews; and acting for Zespri on judicial reviews, contractual disputes, and a competition law claim.

Laura has a six-year-old daughter, and in terms of advice for young women, her key messages would be:

- Always stay true to your own values and character.
- Keep an open mind and be ready to take up unexpected opportunities.
- Understand the trade-offs with any key decisions in life, appreciate that the choices are subjective and the decision must be your own, and be prepared to revisit those choices as life evolves.
- Know your own level of self-confidence and risk tolerance, and believe trusted supporters when in doubt.



PERLINA LAU (Class of 2007)

Perlina (at right, in pink) is a broadcast journalist, Worldwatch Producer and Presenter for Radio New Zealand, and co-creator and co-star of the TVNZ series *Creamerie*. After leaving Baradene, Perlina completed a Bachelor of Communications (Studio Television and Journalism) at the Auckland University of Technology and has since worked in broadcasting. She was previously a Producer for TV3.

Described as a "darkly funny dystopian series," the storyline for Creamerie is that eight years after a viral plague killed all men, three women who run a dairy farm accidentally run over the last surviving male human on the planet. Perlina and a group of colleagues and friends from Flat3 Productions originally pitched Creamerie back in 2018, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. Soon after pitching the idea, Perlina moved to London and worked as a news producer for BBC World. She returned to New Zealand in March 2020 specifically to film Creamerie, and had plans to head back to the UK after they had finished filming. Her arrival just in time for our first COVID-19 lockdown was purely coincidental, and she saw the irony of filming a pandemic black comedy in the middle of an actual pandemic. Filming wrapped in September 2020 and



working around COVID-19 restrictions, using masks, and social distancing made for some interesting and surreal times on set.

At that time, the UK was in and out of lockdowns, so Perlina decided to stay on in New Zealand and successfully applied for the role at RNZ, which means she can continue working in her much-loved field of world news. Perlina also does TV reviews for RNZ. She and her colleagues are now in the process of developing season two of *Creamerie*.





Dr Jo Kennelly (Deputy Head Girl, Class of 1984) has a PhD in Medical Geography and is the founder of Malaika Vx Inc, a Canadian biotech company based in Toronto.

During her time at Baradene, Jo was a keen Geography student. Following the advice of a family friend who said she should "go to University and do what you love", Jo then attended Otago University and obtained a BA(Hons) with First Class Honours in both Geography and Economics.

After University Jo backpacked around Europe, spent a year in London, and was then accepted into Cambridge where she completed a PhD in Medical Geography. After her PhD, Jo completed post-doctoral work in Health Economics at the Royal Free Hospital London (University College). She also spent time as a fellow at the Praed St Clinic, St Mary's Hospital London (part of Imperial College), and the UK Centre for Health Economics, University of York. During this time, Jo studied the relationship between geographical movement and HIV treatment.

Jo returned to New Zealand in the 1990s and held a variety of Government policy roles, including working in the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, advising three Prime Ministers. Jo also raised a family and acknowledges she found combining a high-level career with motherhood challenging, and believes this is something more women should prepare for and talk about. Jo moved to Canada in 2001 and worked in public policy for the National Cancer

Institute of Canada and the Canadian government. Jo was the Director of Policy to Canada's Federal Minister of Health.

She married Dr Frank Plummer, an infectious diseases doctor and globally renowned HIV researcher whose team were the first in the world to identify the causes of the 2003 SARS outbreak and 2009 H1N1 outbreak. Frank's team also developed the highly successful Ebola vaccine. Frank held many leadership roles in Canada's pandemic and infectious disease response, including acting Chief Public Health Officer

of Canada and head of the Global Lab Security Network (G7+ Mexico), and received a Gairdner Award (mini-Nobel) for his scientific efforts. Frank was preparing to become involved in the global response to COVID-19 when he sadly passed away in Kenya in early 2020, while visiting clinics he helped to establish there during the 1980s/1990s.

Frank's work in Kenya ultimately led to the identification of a group of women who have natural immunity to HIV/AIDS, and these studies have led to Jo's current role as founder and owner of Malaika Vx Inc, a Canadian biotech company based in Toronto, which is entering human trials for a preventative HIV vaccine in 2022.

During her career, Jo has been involved in other interesting work, including working with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation on a range of global health topics and for an artificial intelligence company interested in applying machine learning to enhance rapid infectious disease screening and testing technologies.

Until recently, medical geography was a reasonably niche field, but the advent of the SARS and H1N1 viruses and, more latterly, the spread of COVID-19 around the world, have brought the career fields associated with global pandemics into the mainstream.

This year Jo returned to New Zealand for an extended visit and took the opportunity to reconnect with her friends from Baradene's Class of 1984 at an informal reunion. Jo also spoke via videoconference to our scholarship Biology class about her interesting career.



JANE PATTERSON MNZM



Jane's career spans nearly three decades in the professional sporting events industry. In 2016, she was appointed a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) in the New Year's Honours in recognition of her achievements in service to sports administration. Most recently, Jane was appointed Chief Operating Officer (COO) for the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023 (New Zealand and Australia).

Jane came late to Baradene, attending for her 6th and 7th Forms, but she says they were a fantastic couple of years and among her happiest schooling days. She remembers warmly the welcome and support she received from fellow pupils, teachers, and renowned School Principal Bill Fryer.

After leaving Baradene, Jane attended the University of Canterbury, obtaining a BA in Education and Psychology, and went on to gain a Diploma in Public Relations. Early in her career, Jane spent 10 years working in public relations for one of New Zealand's leading firms. In 1997, she joined International Management Group (IMG), the world's largest sports marketing and event management Company. Jane was responsible for the overall management of many major events in New Zealand and Australia including IRONMAN triathlon, New Zealand Golf Open, Brazilian Soccer Tour of Australia, as well as an annual concert series featuring artists Ray Charles, Beach Boys, Doobie Brothers, Julio Iglesias, Lulu, The Hollies, and Dame Kiri Te Kanawa.

In 2004 Jane founded The Patter Ltd, an event management and marketing company which delivered many large-scale sporting events including the REAL Women's Duathlon Series, IRONMAN New Zealand and the Port of Tauranga Half IRONMAN. Jane's experience also led to her managing several World Championship events hosted by New Zealand, including World Netball Championships in 2007, World Roller Figure Skating Championships in 2012, and BMX World Championships in 2013. Between 2013 and 2016,



Jane assumed the role of Chief Operating Officer (COO) for IRONMAN Asia Pacific.

Jane returned to New Zealand from the UK in March 2020 for what should have been a brief visit to see her family when COVID-19 broke out, landing with one suitcase on the last flight before our borders closed, and she hasn't left! In August last year, Jane began working on the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023, and in February 2021 was appointed the event's Chief Operating Officer (COO) for New Zealand.

Jane feels extremely privileged to oversee the largest sporting event New Zealand has ever hosted. She reminds us that it is the third-largest event in the world and the largest event for women. Considerably bigger than the 2011 Rugby World Cup hosted in New Zealand, the FIFA Women's World Cup will see 32 teams play 64 matches over 32 days. Two countries, nine cities, and 10 stadiums! And the stakes are high, because 1.4 billion people watched the final of the last FIFA Women's World Cup in 2019. That's a lot of eyeballs on Australia and New Zealand!

Jane has also embraced her love of sport as a participant. She completed the IRONMAN in Hawaii in 2009, IRONMAN New Zealand in 2015, and several marathons, including Auckland and Paris.

As Jane reflects on her career, she credits her achievements on the foundations of her final years spent at Baradene, her tertiary education, and the relentless support and love from her family and friends. Jane shares many fond memories of her time at Baradene – school sports days, riding her Vespa to school, Mr Fryer's school assemblies, playing netball, and dressing up as "mad scientists" for the end-of-year group photo for the yearbook. Over 30 years on, Jane remains in close contact with the friends she made at Baradene.


