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A WORD FROM THE CHAIR



Gill Chappell, Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, explains the importance of our yearly focus goals and how our chosen goal supports the Baradene community.

Baradene College is privileged to belong to a network of four Sacred Heart schools in Australia (Melbourne, Brisbane, and Sydney) and New Zealand. Each school selects one of the Society of the Sacred Heart's five focus goals as its annual goal. Baradene's 2022 focus goal is "A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values." Our 2021 focus goal was "Personal Growth in an Atmosphere of Wise Freedom." Annually, the Chairs and Principals of each school board convene with the Members of the Provincial Council, which has a role in overseeing the Mission in the schools. Each school reports how they have lived their chosen goal for the previous year.

Baradene recently met with the ANZNET schools and members of the Provincial Council for a day-long videoconference. During the meeting, each school presents a report outlining the actions taken and how the school has demonstrated its commitment to its chosen focus goal. Each focus goal has specific criteria, and each criterion is assessed against indicators, such as "How do you know you had a positive impact?" and "What were the challenges or areas of development arising from the evaluation?"

The wonderful aspect of this meeting is the opportunity to hear firsthand from the other board chairs and principals about their unique environments. We hear their successes and challenges over the year, and learn innovative ideas that we may apply to Baradene.

We typically start the year with a teaching session from the Director of Mission to ensure the boards and staff understand the focus goal and what it means to us. Later in the year, the faculties and boards provide separate reflections about the goal, which feed into the annual goals report. Importantly, formally reporting on the goal each year sets a structure and discipline that ensures the goal is embedded into the year's activities, from professional learning and development to the students' retreats and everyday interactions.

If you are familiar with Baradene's auditorium, you will know that four of the five focus goals are embroidered on the banners hanging on one side of the auditorium, with this year's focus goal hung separately on the opposite side. As you can appreciate, these banners are not just decorative, but represent a real focus for the year's activities.

How fabulous it was to welcome students back into school at the start of the year after the lockdowns and restrictions of 2021. We also have noticed how happy they are to be here on site. On the first day, our new Year 7 students were shown around the school by their Year 13 Big Sisters. We enjoy watching our students grow and make the transition from tentative young people to confident leaders of the school during their years here, a pattern that has been repeated over the 113 years that Baradene has been educating young women and sending them out to take their place in the world.

This year we have had to deal with the reality of higher numbers of COVID-19 cases in Auckland. We continue to be extremely grateful for the collaborative way our parents, teachers, staff, and students have worked together to keep as many of our students at school as possible, while keeping our school community safe.

We are very proud of the way our students are staying positive and facing up to the challenges that come with the traffic-light system. They come to school focussed on their studies, enjoying time with their friends, and making the most of the extra-curricular activities that can be offered. We can learn a lot from them and the resilience they show. This resilience will be very important for them in life beyond school.

None of us could have imagined the disruption the pandemic would cause when we first heard a new virus was spreading around the world in early 2020. But this is not the first time that New Zealand and Baradene have faced such a challenge. In 1918, New Zealand was grappling with the influenza epidemic that was sweeping the globe at the end of World War II. In the Baradene archives, a journal entry made by one of our RSCJ sisters in November 1919 records that all students caught influenza. The roll at the time was approximately 50, and many of those girls were boarders living at the school.

School Journal entry, November 1918:

"Between the 7th and the 10th, every child in the school got influenza and during the next fortnight the dormitories were infirmaries and the mistresses [sisters] infirmarians. Only one child was seriously ill. Winifred Wall, she had double pneumonia and gave much anxiety although she was never in immediate danger. She made a good recovery and was well enough to be down on the Prize day. We have much to thank God for as the other children had a light form of the malady which ended fatally for so many in New Zealand and especially in the district of Auckland."

Just like 100 years ago, we have much to be thankful for today, and hopefully we will soon be able to look back on these strange times as a thing of the past. However, we acknowledge that some families have been more directly impacted than others, and we send our prayers and sympathy to those who have suffered the loss of a loved one during these times.



Alumnae come full circle

It has been pleasing to welcome four alumnae back to Baradene in teaching roles this year. Two of those alumnae have returned as student teachers under our pilot programme, having recently completed university degrees. These four join a number of alumnae on the staff at Baradene. The Baradene community is quite unique in that we enjoy long and rewarding relationships with our alumnae, which gives us a sense of history and continuity and enriches our students' educational experience.

Focus goal reflects academic success

Our focus goal for this year is "A Deep Respect for Intellectual Values." We received excellent Scholarship results in the 2021 academic year. Baradene students attained 50 Scholarships, a number that equals our highest total. Six of those were Outstanding Scholarships, awarded to the top 1% of students in New Zealand. Five students received Scholarships in three or more subjects. A number of the Scholarships were gained by our 2021 Year 12 students, now our 2022 Year 13 cohort. Abigail Mak, this year's Head Girl, received four Scholarships. Abigail and Catherine Hall (Our Dux in 2021, who received five Scholarships) both received NZQA Outstanding Scholar Awards. Only approximately 50 such awards are bestowed each year, and Abigail and Catherine are eligible to receive \$5,000 for each year of their undergraduate degrees. Our NCEA results were also excellent, with over 99% of students attaining NCEA Levels 1, 2, and 3. 94.4% of our students across Levels 1, 2, and 3 had their NCEA certificates endorsed with Excellence or Merit. These results reflect the high level of effort by students and teaching staff during a difficult year with a long periods spent learning online, and are a real credit to all.

Critical thinking and creativity

Academic success obviously forms a large part of our focus goal. However, there is more to intellect than achieving high grades. Developing critical thinking and reasoning is key. There is such a wealth of information accessible to us all now, and the ability to analyse that information and make sense of it is crucial, especially given the amount of misinformation and disinformation readily available online.

With a strong foundation of intellectual knowledge, we aim to challenge our students to use their intellect in creative and entrepreneurial ways. To develop critical thought, integrity, and transparency. To learn to think outside the square. This year we will be opening our "Makerspace" area, which encourages students to collaborate, experiment, problemsolve, invent, and bring their creative projects to life using advanced technological equipment such as 3D printers, laser and vinyl cutters, specialised computers, and photography equipment. Baradene's Growing Heart Foundation will be fundraising to bring Makerspace to life; if you can help us it would be most appreciated.

We also encourage the development of entrepreneurial skills through such programmes as Young Enterprise. These activities build on and enhance our students' intellectual knowledge by stretching their imagination, so they develop creative and critical thinking skills. We recognise that learning not only takes place in the classroom but in all their relationships and experiences.

Navigating the future with hope

On our focus goal day, our staff were fortunate to hear an address by Manuel Beazley, our school kaumatua who is Vicar for Māori for the Diocese of Auckland. Manuel explained the concept of Matauranga Māori and spoke about Pūkengatanga - the Māori spiritual concept that is directed towards the achievement of progressive milestones and skills, enabling individuals to reach their goals and their potential. This is rooted in the understanding that every person possesses Tapu (sacredness) and Mana (spiritual strength). Manuel noted the approach Baradene takes with its religious teachings of spirituality, beauty, and mystery is aligned with Matauranga Māori, and he believes this makes our students better able to navigate the future with hope. Navigating the future with hope is fundamental to our faith. The devastating scenes unfolding in Ukraine in the last few months have been a stark reminder of the horrors of war and that the freedoms and peace we enjoy in New Zealand are not to be taken for granted. We pray that the people of Ukraine may find peace.

We look to the Sisters of the Sacred Heart, those who are here today and those who have gone before them, and we are encouraged by their example of faith and determination to make a difference in the world. Our hope for the future is in the hands of the students we are educating.

Lucy graduated from Baradene in 2016 and then studied a Bachelor of Arts and Commerce conjoint degree at the University of Auckland majoring in Psychology, Accounting, and Commercial Law, with two modules in German. Lucy graduated this year and spent six months of 2021 working in the accounting industry before deciding on a career change to teaching. She considers herself very fortunate to have the opportunity to be a student teacher at Baradene while completing her Postgraduate Teaching Diploma. Emelina Glavaš (Class of 2017)

Emelina followed her degree with a year of postgraduate study, gaining a First Class Honours in Molecular Biology, specialising in employing microbial experimental evolution to investigate the evolution of DNA. During her studies, Emelina also worked in an art gallery and started a small business involving her own art. Late last year, Emelina applied for the Auckland School Trainee (AST) scholarship programme through the University of Waikato and has gratefully accepted a position as a student teacher at Baradene, completing her postgraduate diploma in secondary teaching online.



Jaymee Brearley (Class of 2017)

Jaymee left Baradene after Year 8. After graduating from high school, she attended university where she gained a Bachelor of Arts degree with a double major in Communication and Film, Television, and Media. In 2020, Jaymee had the opportunity to work in the University of Auckland Career Department, where she assisted and supported tertiary students to achieve their career goals. Jaymee always wanted to be a teacher and committed to studying the Graduate Diploma in Teaching (Secondary) in 2021, and will graduate in May. I love seeing students' faces when they understand a new concept or learn a difficult phrase in music. In choir rehearsals, I enjoy the thrill of hearing colours in the harmony, and how each person singing contributes a unique sound.

What are you most looking forward to in your new role?

Music has an amazing ability to create memories that I hope will last a lifetime for students. I am looking forward to having a space that challenges and inspires students to improve from whatever level they may be at. The Intermediate Music Programme at Baradene has the potential to teach students many skills that go far beyond making music, and I hope that these skills will also last a lifetime.

THE VALUE OF MUSIC

Inspired by The Royal Conservatory of Music's report The Benefits of Music Education, Nino Sloser, Head of Music, explains why music study is an important tool for your child's learning.

A wealth of scientific research over the last decade proves that music education is a powerful tool for attaining children's full intellectual, social, and creative potential:

- It speeds the development of speech and reading skills.
- It trains children to focus their attention for sustained periods.
- It helps children gain a sense of empathy for others.

Music study requires a high degree of precision in auditory processing; being almost in tune is not good enough. This means that musically trained children are better able to distinguish subtle details of speech, leading to improved reading, better comprehension, and also a greater ability to interpret what other people – children and adults – are really saying.

Musically trained children develop to their full potential because participation in music is inherently rewarding, making children more likely to devote the time and practice necessary to develop strong cognitive and social abilities. Most importantly, music gives children a means to express themselves, to unleash their creativity, and to be inspired by their own boundless capacity for personal growth.

Through the compulsory Junior Music Programme for our Year 7 and 8 students, which directly impacts curricular and extra-curricular music, Baradene College contributes to the musical education of our students, as well as to their academic success, social wellbeing, and the powerful, long-term value children gain through music study. "Musical activity involves nearly every region of the brain that we know about, and nearly every neural subsystem."

During my two years in the Junior Music Programme, I was lucky enough to be able to learn how to play the saxophone, and really loved it. I learned many new things, such as music theory, notes, and how to work better in a band. I also found that taking itinerant lessons helped me advance further when learning music, and helped me get better at both the saxophone and clarinet. I never realised how fun the Junior Music Programme could be until I got involved, and all the tutors were very nice."

INTRODUCING VINCENZA GOLDING DIRECTOR OF

ASSESSMENT

Get to know Baradene's Director of Assessment, Vincenza Golding.

I am first-generation Australian from Italian migrant parents, and the first person in my family to go to university. My grandparents instilled a love of fashion and crafts in me, as my grandfather was a custom cabinet maker and my grandmother a seamstress. During university, I worked in fashion retail and as a corporate uniform designer. In 1996, I graduated from Sydney University with a Bachelor of Education Design and Technology and Health Studies.

My teaching journey started in coeducational public schools in western Sydney. After getting married and having my first child, my family moved to New Zealand for a trial year which turned into 22 years. I am grateful for the move, as I have had many opportunities to grow into the leader I am today.

Over the years, I have been involved in NZQA marking and moderation processes, and contributed to the development of NZQA achievement standards. During my teaching career, I have also served as a Dean, Assistant HOF (Head of Faculty), and HOF. In 2007, I was awarded a position at Team Solutions as Secondary Technology Advisor for Auckland and Northland, running workshops and supporting teacher practice and assessment during one-on-one visits to schools.

In 2009, I assumed the role of HOF at Baradene and implemented the school's Technology curriculum. This was a highlight of my career, as I started from scratch using the knowledge and experience I had gained from travelling around the country visiting schools. Technology was first offered as a subject at Baradene in 2009, where I was the



sole expert teacher with one context working from a prefab classroom. Today, Baradene has eight Technology staff covering a range of contexts within purpose-built classrooms. As a Technology teacher, I am interested in allowing students the opportunity to think outside the box, and to design and create products with a social and ethical impact on our world.

In 2017 I was granted a Secondary Teacher Study Award, which allowed me to complete my thesis for my Masters in Educational Leadership degree. Focussing on my thesis also gave me the time to engage in self-reflection, and I gained a deeper understanding of myself and my cultural competence and confidence, enabling me to return to Baradene as an effective leader and teacher.

In 2020 I was appointed the Director of Assessment within the Senior Leadership Team. In this role, I have been challenged by the many changes within NCEA assessment. I am privileged to have a hardworking team alongside a committed staff to ensure every student at Baradene is thriving academically, emotionally, and with a strong sense of purpose. This is especially important during these times of uncertainty. I am looking forward to another successful year and being a part of our students' many talents and successes.

A t the end of the 2021 school year, the Alumnae Committee was thrilled to welcome the 2021 school leavers to the Alumnae Association at their leavers' liturgies. On behalf of the Alumnae Association, a wooden block inscribed with a quote by St Madeleine Sophie Barat was presented to these new alumnae.

THE TINIEST DETAILS

Erskine College alumna Anne Noble reflects on her formative years with the RSCJ and the influence of her Sacred Heart education on a life's work.

Erskine College* as a boarder from 1965 until 1969. Her mother had attended a Sacre Coeur school in Tunbridge Wells, England, and her fond memories of that experience influenced her choice of school for Anne.

Anne reflects that during her years at Erskine she was influenced and formed by some wonderful women, the RSCJ sisters, and what really left a mark on her was their emphasis on the development of the interior world of the spirit. Anne always remembers the sisters as strong independent intellectual women who fostered in her a great love of music and literature.

The architecture at Erskine placed the sisters and their spiritual life at the centre of the building and the school

wrapped itself around this central core. Anne remembers the bell ringing for Divine Office and the nuns disappearing into the heart of the building. Education was their primary charism. Anne recalls singing in the beautiful chapel with its fabulous acoustics, but it wasn't until she visited Paris years later that she identified the very French origins of the architecture of the main Erskine College building. Anne recognises that these influences seep in and form you whether you are aware of it or not, and she has some very interesting memories of her school days.

After Erskine, Anne attended Victoria University and Wellington Teachers' College, but her developing interest in art and photography culminated with her undertaking a fine arts degree at Elam School of Fine Arts at the University of Auckland, graduating with a Masters in Fine Arts (Honours 1st Class) in 1983.

Anne is a distinguished Professor of Fine Art (Photography) at Massey University's College of Creative Arts, where she has taught for many years, and is one of New Zealand's most

well-known and accomplished photographers.

The contemplative nature of the RSCJ sisters who educated her may have indeed influenced Anne, as her photography involves attentive watching and observation over long periods. Her work, often in series, has included such subject matter as the Whanganui River, the lives of a silent order of Benedictine nuns in London, and Antarctica.

However, over the last 10 years, Anne has become fascinated with honeybees, and a journey that started when she installed beehives to assist fruit production in her own backyard has led to the publication of a beautiful book, *Conversātiō – In the Company of Bees* (Massey University Press).

During that 10-year period, Anne had a residency at a decommissioned Cistercian monastery in France, and it was there that the idea of displaying a live colony of bees within an artwork was formed. Her many projects and exhibitions culminated in the presentation of *Conversātiō* – *A Cabinet of Wonder* at the Asia Pacific Triennial APT9 at the Queensland Art Gallery in 2018-19. The intriguing story of Anne's engagement and collaboration with a cabinet maker, a biological scientist, a physicist who was also a beekeeper, and museum staff is told in the book. Together they brought a special cabinet of curiosity to life by exhibiting a photographic work with a colony of bees at its heart.

Throughout the book and in her work, Anne's grave concern for the future of bees is evident. Humans have had a symbiotic relationship with bees for thousands of years, and the bee is now at its most vulnerable due to environmental change and disease. Anne's work explores the unthinkable notion of a future without bees and the exhibition, as if from a museum of the future displaying bees from the past, creates a thought-provoking and poignant intermingling of life and death.

The gorgeously illustrated book features stunningly detailed photographs of bees taken using both the scientific method of electron microscopy and the old-fashioned method of imprinting light-sensitive materials. The images capture the

ephemeral and, so tiny they are almost invisible, parts of the bees. Anne's beautifully elegiac portraits of dead bees, displayed alongside a living colony of bees, provides a parallel experience of life and death through an intimate connection to a living ecosystem.

The book was longlisted in the 2022 Ockham New Zealand Book Awards for the Booksellers Aotearoa New Zealand Award for Illustrated Non-Fiction and was named among Art Beats' Best Art Books of 2021.

* Erskine College in Island Bay, Wellington was Baradene's sister school and closed in 1985. We are honoured to celebrate the achievements of Erskine alumnae in Baradene Heart.



LET THERE BE LIGHT

Baradene alumna, author, and photographer Bridget Hackshaw (Class of 1973) has written a beautiful book, The Architect and the Artists: Hackshaw, McCahon, Dibble.

The book examines the relationships between Bridget's father, Group architect James (Jim) Hackshaw, and artists Colin McCahon and Paul Dibble, and catalogues the work produced by that very special and unique collaboration. The book has been a personal labour of love for Bridget which has taken many years of dedicated research, and she is thrilled that this body of work has now been documented.

James Hackshaw (1926-1999) has always been well known for his work with the Group and for the many private residences he designed during his lifetime. What is less well known is that in the 1960s and 1970s, the Catholic church engaged Hackshaw to design seven churches and another 10 schools or parish buildings. Vatican II changed the way churches interacted with their parishioners, and Hackshaw's buildings, with their relaxed, informal spaces, were perfectly suited to the times. His novel approach also involved the use of local materials, craftsmen, and artists to adorn the churches instead of the imported art and materials that had been used previously, which resulted in a rare marriage of modernist architecture and contemporary religious art.

For these projects, Hackshaw worked with well-known but yet to be fully recognised painter Colin McCahon to design the stained-glass windows, and the then very young sculptor Paul Dibble to produce bronze tabernacles, crucifixes, and candlesticks. The work was highly influential for both artists – the Catholic imagery influenced McCahon's religious paintings over the subsequent decade, and the commissions allowed Dibble to develop his skills working with bronze, a material otherwise too expensive for the young sculptor to use.

BRIDGET HACKSHAN

After recently training as an architectural photographer, Bridget has visited and captured stunning recent images of many of these existing pieces of art, including McCahon's stained-glass windows at Baradene College. Originally designed for Hackshaw's Barat science block in 1975, which was removed to allow the building of the larger Barat block in 2002, much care was taken to preserve McCahon's windows and reposition them in the Sophia Chapel, where they remain today.

Bridget believes that many of the rituals in her early years at Baradene contributed to her wanting to photograph "sacred spaces". She started at Baradene in Standard 3 and has vivid and very fond memories of primary school art classes at Baradene held in the old tram with Mrs Denton, and also of being very excited to read Gerard Manly Hopkins' poetry with Sister Hill in Form 6. Bridget first met McCahon in 1966, and she later discovered their shared passion for Hopkins. In 7th Form Art History, Bridget did a project on Group Architects and her father took her to visit and photograph many Group houses, an interesting foretelling of her present work.

What is evident from the striking images throughout the book is the transformative effect McCahon's stained-glass windows have as they bathe Hackshaw's spaces in light. Coloured light floods and uplifts these spaces, making them something truly special and, well, heavenly!

Not surprisingly, *The Architect and the Artists: Hackshaw, McCahon, Dibble* (Massey University Press) has been shortlisted in the Ockham New Zealand Book Awards as one of four finalists for the Booksellers Aotearoa New Zealand Award for Illustrated Non-Fiction. Along with Erskine College alumna Anne Noble's book *Conversātiō* – *In the Company of Bees* (featured on previous pages) it has been named as one of Art Beats' Best Art Books of 2021. The book has also been very well received and reviewed in *Architecture Now, Home*, and *Here* magazines, among other publications.

Bridget is also producer of a documentary that accompanies the book, directed by Christopher Dudman, which will be released later this year. The film will take you inside these special spaces to give you the feeling invoked by this marvellous intersection of art and architecture.

Geraldine (Gerry) Campbell (née Miller, Class of 1959) has recently celebrated her 80th Birthday and reflects back fondly on her time at Baradene.

Geraldine attended Baradene College in the 1950s and remembers her Baradene days very fondly, especially her time as Deputy Head Girl in 1959. After Baradene, Geraldine attended Palmerston North Teachers' College and became a teacher. Later she went overseas as an International Farm Youth Exchange student, travelling to the USA and Canada.

After marrying her husband Jamey, they settled in Ontario, Canada and adopted three children from South

Korea to complete their family. On her 80th birthday, Geraldine enjoyed a birthday party with close family and friends, the arrival of COVID-19 in Canada putting paid to her plans for a larger event. On display at her birthday party was a photo from her Baradene Debutante Ball, which caused a lot of discussion and interest. Geraldine still has her debutante dress and long white gloves. Geraldine keeps in touch with her school friends from Baradene, despite living on the other side of the world.



For many years, Geraldine was involved with the Federated Women's Institute of Ontario, eventually becaming their Public Relations Officer. She was also the Ontario Secretary for the Society of St Vincent de Paul. Having been involved in craft making for many years, Geraldine now makes quilt blankets for Canada Food for Children, an organisation started by St Teresa of Calcutta, which helps the poor in Africa and the Caribbean. Last year she made 170 blankets, thanks to COVID-19 lockdowns, an increase from her usual 100 blankets a year. Turning 80 has caused Geraldine to reflect on her life and her time at Baradene:

"As school starts a new year in New Zealand, memories of my first few days at Baradene float back. I came to Baradene as a boarder from my family farm in the Taranaki.

"It was 1955 and I knew no one else when I first went there; it was one of the hottest Februaries for a long time and we were in full winter uniform. There was no summer uniform then, and my mother had bought the very best thick lisle stockings which were so hot!

"My aunt and mother had attended the Convent of the Sacred Heart in Timaru. I still have the statue my aunt was given when she started. My aunt was best friends with Mother Winifred Mahar when she attended Timaru. So, if I did anything wrong, I would be told by Mother Mahar, "I know what your dear aunt and mother would think of that!"

"I was a boarder and all articles of clothing had to have my name and number attached. My number was 64, and I still use that number as my lucky number.

"For going to any service in chapel, we wore black veils on our heads, and for all special occasions, a longer white veil. Mine started out as the veil I had for my First Communion, then when I left Baradene my sister used it, then my daughter used it for her First Communion, then five years ago this coming Easter, my granddaughter wore it for her First Communion.

"Everything that I have accomplished in my life I owe to the training and experience I was given at Baradene, and for that I am forever grateful."

Two high-achieving Erskine College alumna had fascinating life stories.

Mary Elizabeth Fama (née Duncan), alumna of Erskine College (23 October 1938 – 9 June 2021)

An extraordinary story of intelligence, faith, and resilience. Mary Fama came from an artistic and creative family; her mother was the artist Catherine (Kitty) Duncan, founding owner of the Bett-Duncan Gallery in Wellington.

From 1949, Mary and her older sister Anna both attended Erskine College, and both had a deep, unswerving faith.

Mary's extended family of many cousins also attended Erskine or other Society of the Sacred Heart (RSCJ) sister schools around the world, including Kincoppal and Rose Bay in Sydney, Australia (there were two schools then), Tunbridge Wells (Kent, England), and Woldingham (Surrey, England); their grandmothers had attended the Convents of the Sacred Heart in Island Bay, Timaru, Roehampton (London, England), and Rue de Vareene (Paris, France) – now the home of Rodin Museum – so the family was steeped in the ways of Sacred Heart education.

At Erskine, Mary excelled in all her studies, gaining a national university scholarship in her final year. After school, she completed a BA at the University of Canterbury, and then travelled to England to study, gaining a BA (First Class) in Mathematics at Oxford University. After returning to New Zealand, she worked in the applied mathematics division of the DSIR (Department of Scientific and Industrial Research).

At 28 years of age, with the support of a Fulbright travel



grant, a New Zealand Federation of University Fellowship, and a Harvard Fellowship, Mary attended Harvard University, graduating in 1967 with a PhD in applied mathematics.

In 1968, she met Peter Fama, a psychiatrist who became her husband, and they moved together to Sydney, where Mary became a junior lecturer at the University of Sydney. While they returned to New Zealand for a short time, they eventually settled in Brisbane. Mary was appointed Senior Scientist at the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research organisation (CSIRO) and it was in Brisbane that they spent the majority of their married and family life.

While enjoying much academic achievement and career success, tragically, Mary and Peter endured great personal sadness. They had four children; their first child Paul was premature and died only a few hours after birth. They then had three more children, Michael and twins Susan and Christopher, who initially appeared healthy, but as they grew older it became apparent that they were all afflicted with a neurological condition called Friedreich's ataxia, which caused increasing disability and their early deaths in their late twenties and early thirties.

Despite their condition, all of Mary and Peter's children achieved well. Following the family tradition, Mary's daughter Susan attended school at Baradene's sister school Stuartholme in Brisbane. Susan then gained an arts degree and became a journalist. Christopher followed in Mary's footsteps and completed a PhD in mathematics.

Mary remained close to the Society of the Sacred Heart throughout her life, and was for many years a Board member for the Society's Duchesne College in the University of Queensland. Mary herself suffered from ill health; undiagnosed pulmonary tuberculous suffered during childhood caused lung disease in later life. In 2010 Mary and Peter retired and returned to New Zealand, settling in Havelock North.

Despite her many accomplishments Mary remained an accessible and understated person; she remained very interested in people and was the sort of friend who was always there if you needed her. In her later years, she pursued her passion for social justice and immersed herself in parish life in Havelock North. Many of her fellow parishioners had no knowledge of the high-powered academic in their midst as she washed dishes and visited the local Marae with them.

There was a simplicity about Mary that was due to her deep faith. There were only four students in Mary's final year at Erskine, and they all remained very close to each other and devoted to Sister June Kirk-Smith, who taught them in the Upper Sixth, their final year at school.

Mary's life is an inspirational one of academic achievement and personal resilience. Despite the difficulties and setbacks, Mary's faith and inborn determination carried her through.

Dr Heather (Angela) Ballara (alumna of Erskine College, 16 August 1944 – 17 September 2021) Erskine College alumna Angela Ballara was an astonishing

woman who achieved much in her life. Angela managed to juggle being the wife of a diplomat and a devoted mother of six children, all the while pursuing her own academic studies and learning Te Reo Māori. She had a beautiful singing voice, and from her late teens until 2016, Angela sang on and off in the St Mary of the Angels



Choir. At choir she met her husband Bruno – a young Italian (and later a diplomat), the tenor to her soprano – and became a fluent in Italian. In later life, Angela received an Italian Knighthood of the Order of Merit.

Practical, forthright, and possessing a formidable intellect, Angela completed her studies with a BA and MA in History from the University of Auckland in 1969 and 1973, and a PhD from Victoria University in 1991 while simultaneously raising her six children.

In the early 1990s, Angela worked on the *Dictionary* of New Zealand Biography. Angela was a leading academic authority on Māori customary history and with her, ability to read and translate Te Reo Māori, she made a significant contribution to the success of the *Dictionary*. In 2003, Angela was appointed to the Waitangi Tribunal where she became a well-respected member, surprising many with her deep knowledge of whakapapa, and only resigning in 2016 due to ill health. Over the years, Angela wrote three books on Māori history: *Proud to be White? A Study of Racial Prejudice in New Zealand*; *Taua: "Musket Wars"*, *"Land Wars", or Tikanga? Warfare in Māori Society in the Early Nineteenth Century*, and a book based on her PhD thesis, *Iwi: The Dynamics of Māori Tribal Organisation*, *c1769-c1945*.

Two of Angela's daughters, **Sira (Class of 1983)** and **Anna-Maria Ballara (Class of 1984)** attended Baradene College in the 1980s.

In Memoriam

We remember the alumnae and members of the Baradene community who have recently passed.

Ann Ursula Meredith (née Buckland, Class of 1956) Ann Meredith passed away on 6 December 2021, aged 82 years. Ann and her sister Mikki Buckland both attended Baradene as boarders in the 1950s. Ann's cousins Annette Grey (née Heasley) and Sally Ewart (née Kirk) also attended, the four cousins all attending Baradene at the same time, three of them in one class.

Angela Mary McKinstry (Class of 1977)

Angela McKinstry passed away unexpectedly on 13 January 2022, aged 61 years. This was hugely sad and shocking for her family, especially as it came not long after the death of her younger sister **Fiona Fox (née McKinstry, Class of 1982)** on 19 March 2021.

Angela was a weekly border at Baradene for several years, and during that time she developed friendships that lasted her lifetime.

The McKinstry family has a long association with Baradene; their father Garry J McKinstry was Chairman of the Board of Governors and the Baradene College Trust Board, and a trusted friend and advisor to the Baradene Community between 1970 and 1990. The Baradene Library is dedicated to the memory of Garry McKinstry in recognition of his loyal and dedicated service. We send our sympathies to the McKinstry family on the loss of their two much-loved sisters.

REPOSE EN PAIX

Sister Philippa Mary Estelle Wittering RSCJ (13 February 1928 – 18 October 2021) was a beloved icon of the Baradene RSCJ community.

Sister Wittering went home to God on 18 October 2021, aged 93. The Year 7 and 8 students had a special relationship with Sister Wittering, and every 13 February, they lined the halls of the Duchesne building to sing "Happy Birthday" to her as she processed down the corridor, smiling and greeting the students. Her 90th birthday a few years ago was a particularly memorable occasion. Sister Wittering loved birthdays and had an incredible recall for birth dates, often greeting staff members with a mention of their birthday and even those of their children!

Sister Wittering was born Philippa Mary Estelle Wittering in England and moved to Australia as a child. In 1940, she left her rural home in the Australian outback to attend secondary school at the Convent of the Sacred Heart, Rose Bay in Sydney, Baradene's sister school. Following a strong calling, she subsequently entered the Noviceship there in 1948. She assisted in the classroom at Rose Bay and later at Stuartholme in Brisbane.

In 1955, Sister Wittering left Brisbane for her final training in Rome, was professed to the Society and took her final vows on 11 February 1956 (and would no doubt have been pleased that this date was so close to her own birthday). In 1968, Sister Wittering returned to Brisbane, serving at Duchesne, the Society's College within the University of Queensland.

She first came to Baradene as school bursar in 1986, and for several years she travelled back and forward between New Zealand and Australia. However, she returned to Baradene for a final time in 2001, settling back into the joy of her many friends here and assisting the College and community. While Baradene became her much-loved home, she continued to have a deep love for Australia, all her life introducing herself as an Australian.

Sister Wittering had an abiding interest in all that happened at Baradene, and an interest too in the lives of all those who worked for the College. For many years, she was the RSCJ representative on the PTA, and she enjoyed providing hospitality to visitors. She sorted the school and RSCJ mail for many years, and helped out in the Baradene College Ltd office regularly. Her faithful service, loyalty and kindness endeared her to many.

On the day of her private Requiem Mass, held at the Sophia Chapel on 21 October 2021, the driveway was lined with the straw hats of our junior school uniform, a silent and respectful tribute from the students who loved her and, due COVID-19 restrictions at the time, were not able to be there to celebrate her life with her family and the RSCJ community. We will all miss Sister Wittering very much, especially on 13 February.
