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## A WORD FROM THE CHAIR



#### A word from Gill Chappell, Chair of the Board of Trustees.

A s this issue of *Heart Magazine* profiles a number of students who have travelled overseas on exchanges and educational trips, I have been reflecting on my own year on

a student exchange in Central America. Well before the days of the internet, instant information and communication, my parents entrusted me to the care of an unknown family on the other side of the world, who did not speak the same language and could not locate New Zealand on a map. Knowing equally little about their country other than what could be gleaned from a paragraph in the *Encyclopaedia Britannica*, it was a leap of faith for my parents, me, and the family who "adopted" me for a year. It may have been the most formative year of my life.

Janet Erskine Stuart RSCJ, in referring to the wonders of the everyday, also expressed some of the sentiments of a student exchange when she said:

"We are then the discoverers of our own lives. Our world is new every day. Either we are sailing towards new shores, daring mariners in search of the unknown and day by day the horizon dips lower and our stars rise higher, or we are explorers by land, and new wonders reveal themselves on each day's march."

Even in an era of instant global communication, an exchange requires a student to fully step outside the comfort of their world into a new, unknown world. It challenges and redefines their "everyday" by providing insight into someone else's day-to-day experiences. Even discovering something as simple as the fact that not everyone eats the same sort of food or that a school runs differently are observations that may teach enhanced tolerance and compassion. Partaking in an exchange requires a desire to explore and be open to new environments that are not entirely in a student's control. The "new wonders" of those experiences can be significant and long-lasting.

The exchange programmes available to Baradene students offer valuable opportunities to learn about other countries, schools and cultures. They are supported and encouraged by the Board as one strand of the College's strategic goal to prepare students for life after school as global citizens. We wish all of our students who have the chance to participate in exchanges the opportunity to make new connections, build community within the Sacred Heart network and make lifelong memories.

I often reflect on the special bond students and alumnae share. This issue, with its theme of "Sisterhood", really brings those special connections to the fore. Not only does Baradene have many students attending with sisters from the same family, but our students often share sister-like bonds which extend throughout their lives as alumnae of Baradene. The idea of sisterhood also celebrates our RSCJ Sisters, who established Baradene over 110 years ago and founded sister schools in 41 countries around the world, with whom we share the common goal of educating in the tradition of our foundress, Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat RSCJ.

Accordingly, it was fitting that in the week we celebrated the Feast of the Sacred Heart, we were joined by students from our three Australian sister schools in Sydney, Brisbane, and Melbourne; and from sister schools in Madrid, Spain, and Princeton, Boston, and Greenwich in the USA. It is heartening to think that our sister schools would all have been celebrating the Feast of the Sacred Heart at the same time, in many different countries around the world.

The opportunities for exchange with our sister schools adds a special dimension to the educational experience offered at Baradene, allowing students to gain a global perspective, form close bonds with students from RSCJ schools in other countries, and learn firsthand about different cultures. During the Feast of the Sacred Heart, these bonds were further developed when we raised funds for the RSCJ Sisters' charity SHIFT, which works with communities in the Philippines. The desire to come together to help others is something we work hard to foster, and we are thankful for the support our community gave to this worthy cause.

#### Encouraging body positivity

In June, together with the Senior Leadership team, I attended the Asia Pacific Summit on Girls' Education. We were greatly interested in the keynote speech of Taryn Brumfitt, the 2023 Australian of the Year. Taryn spoke about the importance of building positive body images for girls in the school setting. We encourage parents and students to watch Tarryn's documentaries *Embrace* for adults and *Embrace Kids* for students. *Embrace Kids* has been proven to help students accept themselves as they are and, in the age of social media, this is more important than ever.

#### Baradene in the media

Baradene has been identified as one of New Zealand's top schools in recent media reports. Baradene was ranked in the top 10 by the private tutoring company Crimson Education in its list of schools that give students the best opportunity for getting into well-regarded universities overseas. The same article noted that Baradene received 50 scholarship awards in 2021 and a 53% NCEA excellence rate – which was tied for highest in the country. You can read the article at bit.ly/3L5brnw

*Metro* also recently reported that in 2021, Baradene received first place in NCEA subject results in English, Social Sciences, Science, Mathematics, and Technology, and also charted our high UE pass rate.

#### Update on NCEA Level I

There has been much discussion in the media about changes to NCEA Level 1 in 2024. Our Senior Leadership team and teachers considered what is best for our students and consulted with parents, and ultimately we decided that next year our students will not sit the new Level 1 NCEA Achievement Standards. We are concerned that these new standards do not adequately prepare students for the more challenging courses in Level 2, particularly advanced Mathematics and Science courses. In addition, many courses currently available for our students wishing to pursue specific studies in Accounting, Economics, Media Studies, Computer Science, and Food Innovation have been removed. In essence, the new standards do not offer the depth and breadth needed for the current Level 2 Achievement Standards that this cohort of students will sit in 2025. It will also be beneficial for this cohort to have more time at school at the end of Year 11 to better prepare them for NCEA Level 2 in Year 12. #### Accolades for our athletes

We have had some outstanding sporting success this year. Baradene was named Top Secondary Girls School at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Orienteering Championships, and Top Girls School at the North Island Secondary Schools Road Cycling Championships. At the New Zealand Secondary Schools Swimming Competition, our Senior Medley team broke not only the NZSS record, but also the NZ Open record, which was an incredible achievement by this young team. Additionally, Amelia Bray (Year 12) has had excellent results at the Trinbago 2023 Commonwealth Youth Games held in Trinidad and Tobago, winning New Zealand's first medal of the games with Silver in the 50m butterfly, and also achieving Bronze in the 100m butterfly. As a member of the worldwide Sacred Heart Schools network, Baradene students have the unique opportunity to engage in exchanges with our sister schools, providing invaluable experiences.

**B**aradene College is part of an international network of more than 140 Sacred Heart Schools worldwide. Each school is connected by the vision of the Society's foundress Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat RSCJ. Our motto is "Cor Unum – One Heart and One Mind in the Heart of Jesus Christ". The network aims to help nurture a sense of community among Sacred Heart schools worldwide and ensure that every Sacred Heart school feels the strength of belonging to a larger whole, of sharing principles and values, broad issues, hopes and ambitions.

We currently participate in Sacred Heart Schools exchanges with the USA (Louisiana, Connecticut, California, Massachusetts, Missouri, Washington, and Maryland), Spain, France, Austria, and Australia, as well as a virtual exchange programme with Australia, Japan, and Taiwan.

The aim for each student participating in the International Exchange Programme is to extend their education beyond the classroom and to further personal growth, independence, initiative, leadership, self-discipline, and community spirit in line with the Society of the Sacred Heart Goals. The hope is for them to make lifelong friendships, open long-lasting opportunities, and create unforgettable memories on the way.

Students in Years 9 -10 participate in exchanges with our Australian sister schools, while those in Years 11-13 travel further afield. Places are offered at Sacred Heart schools, depending on availability and suitability. Senior overseas students typically visit between March and September for two to four weeks, and our students visit after NCEA exams in the December/January holidays. Families are responsible for airfares, insurance, and other related travel costs. Students are hosted by the exchange family and then reciprocate when the student visits New Zealand. This year, 10 Baradene students participated in Senior Exchanges in France, Spain, and the USA.

#### Virtual Exchange Programme

The Virtual Exchange Programme was initiated when COVID-19 hit, and enabled Year 9 and 10 students from Sacred Heart schools in Australia, Japan, and Taiwan to connect online and investigate and discuss global issues. We continue this programme each year as it allows students from each country to lead and inform the discussions, and share challenges and cultural perspectives on various topics.

Baradene is lucky to be part of an international network of Sacred Heart Schools. It helps create wonderful opportunities for students to practise the language they are learning. Our French exchange with Le Sacré-Coeur La Perverie in Nantes, France, was established in 2008 with two girls participating. The programme has grown over the years, and we are now able to have four students involved in this reciprocal exchange.



## EUROPE EXCHANGES

#### France Exchange: Rachel Green (Year 13)

Over the 2022 summer holidays, I went on a seven-week exchange to our sister school, La Perverie, in Nantes, France, with three other students. Everyday school life is very different at La Perverie compared to Baradene. They begin class at 8am with no homeroom and finish at 5pm most days. While at La Perverie, I took five subjects, with some classes being two hours long. Lunchtime was 1.5 hours, and we could either bring our own food, get a click-and-collect lunch, eat at the cafeteria, or go out of school. Over the Christmas break, I spent a week in Paris with my host family, and we visited the Louvre, Eiffel Tower, Montmartre, Champs Elysée, Versailles, and many other cool places. The final of the Football World Cup was also on while I was in Paris, and with France in the final, there were people everywhere watching the match. We also spent a few days in the Loire Valley and the West Coast. In the Loire Valley, we took a tour of Château d'Amboise and visited Château de Luc Closé, where Leonardo da Vinci lived. On the West Coast, we went to the beautiful beach of La Baule. I also spent a fun day at Disneyland Paris. Overall, I loved my time in France; it was an unforgettable experience. Not only was I able to improve and use my French more, but I also made new friends and had many new and different experiences.

Despite some differences, our schools had many similarities, such as logos, statues, and photos of Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat RSCJ and Saint Rose Philippine Duchesne RSCJ. Being on an exchange and out of our comfort zone taught us many new skills of adaptability and resilience. We enjoyed our time there and made many new friends and memories.

## USA EXCHANGES

## Introducing our Year 7 & 8 Deans

## LISA JENKINS, Year 7 Dean

## Lisa Jenkins has a great love for Cor Unum and is passionate about sharing it with our Year 7 students.

I am originally from Wales and was raised in a traditional Celtic home with poetry, singing, and laughter. My father was in business management and often worked from home (unheard of in the 1980s!) and my mother worked six days a week in sales. Their ambition, life goals, and passion for education meant I was expected to go to university. I had the most wonderful teachers at high school who loved me and gifted me with a thirst for adventure and learning, especially my Religious Education teacher, Mrs Hughes.

At age 16 I decided I wanted to be a teacher, and I applied to Cardiff University to study Theology and Religious Studies. After gaining my teaching qualification, I taught in Wales for 10 years in roles such as Religious Education teacher, Head of Year, and Head of Religious Studies. I then immigrated to New Zealand with my husband James in 2011, and taught Theology and Philosophy at St Peter's College, Grafton, for 10 years before joining Baradene in 2021 as Assistant Head of RE.

It is a passion of mine to steer our young girls in the right direction in life, and navigate the journey of social media, screen time, friendships, and high expectations of women in the 21st century. As a mother of two young daughters,

I am well aware of how difficult it is to "do everything", and it is my aim to walk alongside the youngest members of our school community in their transition to college and, with Cor Unum, teach them how to be. My advice is to be themselves, not look at what others have or others are achieving. Not everyone comes to college at the same age or stage, and so if we compare ourselves, it may make us feel unworthy. Each of us is unique and made in the image and likeness of God; we have gifts and talents that are ours alone and must celebrate them.

I encourage parents to get involved in their daughter's life at Baradene, through coaching or joining the PTA, as these provide amazing opportunities to be with your children and see them grow. I also recommend not being afraid to ask questions about their child's learning so that students come to Baradene with the best possible picture of their learning needs, and they can feel confident in the knowledge that nothing is holding them back.



I believe you have to be firm but fair. You have to be solution-based and transparent. Students respect you when they know you are talking to them as a person and not undermining their views or opinions. I hope the students know I care and would help and support them navigate any issue, especially ones they have to learn from – mistakes are often how we learn best, but we have to acknowledge that we reflect, learn, and move on.



One of the most important aspects of Baradene is the spirit of Cor Unum and the combination of heart and mind in Jesus Christ. For me, it is a great honour to be able to remind students that they are loved and worthy through Jesus's sacrifice and love. The trailblazing women of the Society of the Sacred Heart were and are amazing; they provide our young people with empowerment, self-worth, and religious respect, and this model is one which our young women will utilise for their whole lives.

## SARAH WHITEHEAD, Year 8 Dean



#### Sarah Whitehead (Class of 1985) is a Baradene alumna who brings her love of teaching and genuine connection with students to her role as Year 8 Dean.

A fter a History and Education Degree, I completed a Graduate Diploma in Design Studies and worked in the graphic design and publishing industry for 20 years. I always thought teaching would be a pathway I would pursue, and retrained around 10 years ago. I immediately loved the career change and still love the connection, variety, and community that teaching provides.

I specialised in the Social Sciences, with History and Social Studies, also teaching in the Religious Education, Commerce and Technology Faculties. I also completed a Postgraduate Diploma and further study with a focus on technology in education. My role has recently expanded to include leading the Year 7 to 10 Humanities programme as we implement the new curriculum changes and integrate Aotearoa New Zealand Histories.

From teaching across so many year levels at Baradene, I see the value in helping our younger students develop the social, emotional, and academic foundations that will stand them in good stead through their senior years. They are at an age where they're forming opinions, exploring their interests, and trying to figure out who they are.

on the specific needs and concerns of this age group. It is so rewarding to see the progress that many students in this year group make over the course of the year. The intermediate years are a time of significant change in so many ways, and it's natural for students to feel a mix of excitement and uncertainty.

A significant aspect of my role is communication and working as part of a team. As a Dean, I have the opportunity to advocate for students and ensure their needs are met. I work closely with teachers, parents, and other staff members to identify and address any challenges students might be facing, whether academically, socially, or emotionally. Listening carefully, keeping an open mind, and engaging with all available supports are vital in creating a safe and secure environment where students are in the best position to learn. Our strong pastoral team helps to create a nurturing and inclusive environment where students can explore their interests, build friendships, and develop a sense of identity.

These years at Baradene are special because our students benefit from a close-knit intermediate environment with weekly level assemblies and homeroom groups which sit alongside the high-level specialist classroom teaching of an excellent secondary school. The Year 7 and 8 cohorts can draw on the experiences of, and form relationships with, the senior students, which eases their transition into Year 9 schooling and offers peer support.

The foundation of faith and connection to Baradene's Sacred Heart Focus Goals help to develop spiritual, social, and emotional competencies, allowing our students to achieve to the best of their abilities.



## In the July school holidays, Year 12 and 13 History students travelled to Vietnam and Cambodia.

History students at Baradene College study the two Indochina Wars, focusing on the fight against French colonialism, the development of Vietnamese nationalism, and New Zealand's involvement in the Second Indochina War in Vietnam. In the July school holidays, 25 Year 12 and 13 History Students were lucky enough to embark on an educational adventure to Vietnam and Cambodia alongside Mr Coutts, Mr Johnston, and Ms Whitehead. The two-week History trip was an incredible experience, exploring the rich history and culture of Vietnam and Cambodia. It was hot, in the mid-30°C, and students had to adjust, as the northern hemisphere heatwave extended to Asia this year.

In Hà Nội, the capital of Vietnam, students were immersed in the hustle and bustle of the city, a tour in US army jeeps through the city streets being a highlight. In the former imperial capital city of Hue, Emperor Ming

Man's tomb was a highlight, along with a day trip to the Demilitarised Zone, which marked the border between North and South Vietnam, and the Vinh Moc tunnels, where North Vietnamese lived underground to escape US bombing. In the town of Hoi An, students enjoyed wandering the streets of the historic old town and shopping. A day trip to the My Lai massacre site, where 500 unarmed civilians, mostly women and children, were murdered by US forces in March 1968, refocused the students back on history. At this site, they were privileged to hear from a veteran Viet Cong Colonel about his experiences at the time.

Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon) was their last destination in Vietnam, where students visited the South Vietnam Presidential Palace and Vietnam War Museum, which gave them a different understanding of this time in history with its graphic photography exhibitions and prison cell replicas, along with its focus on Agent Orange. At the Cu Chi Tunnels just outside the city, students got to learn about the Viet Cong fighting techniques, and tour through some of the tunnels used to hide from the American soldiers during the Second Indochina War.





Cambodia was poignant for many. In Phnom Penh, students visited the Killing Fields and the Tuol Sleng Genocide Museum, which showed the brutality Cambodians faced from the Khmer Rouge regime. In Siem Reap, students were fortunate to explore Angkor Wat and Angkor Thom. The overgrown temple complex of Ta Phrom (famous from the movie *Tomb Raider*) and the intricately carved temple of Banteay Srei were outstanding. These ancient Khmer civilisation historical ruins were a stark contrast to that country's more recent brutal history. From the loud and buzzing cities to its peaceful countryside and beautiful beaches, the culture, food, and history in both Vietnam and Cambodia made for an incredibly rich educational experience.

## Baradene students made a pilgrimage to Our Lady of La Vang Shrine in Vietnam.



Students on the History trip were privileged to make a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of La Vang, north of the city of Hue in Vietnam. This is the place where the Virgin Mary appeared in 1798. Catholics come here on pilgrimages from all over the world. Our students held a liturgy at the shrine, emphasising peace and reconciliation. In 1798, the Vietnamese

Emperor restricted the practice of Catholicism. The persecution of Catholics was very violent, and many fled into the forest at La Vang. In the forest, they gathered on the grass at the foot of a banyan tree and prayed. The Virgin Mary appeared to them, holding the infant Jesus in her arms. She descended to the grass near the banyan tree and lovingly consoled the Catholic believers. She told them, "Be confident, consent to suffering. I have answered your prayers. From now on, when you come before me in this place, I will grant all the graces you ask for." She appeared at La Vang a number of other times to people.

On 19 June 1998, Pope John Paul II publicly recognised the importance of Our Lady of La Vang and expressed a desire to rebuild the La Vang Basilica in commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the first vision. The vast new Basilica stands behind the original ruined church, which was damaged during the war and left as a monument.

Catholics come to La Vang on pilgrimages to pray and ask for grace. The Virgin Mary has kept her promise to those who have made the journey. Baradene students prayed at the shrine's statue that marks the place where she appeared. It was a moving experience for our students, with another Vietnamese group rhythmically chanting prayers for peace in the background as our students held their own liturgy.

The liturgy referenced St Paul's letter to the Galatians: "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." While honouring Mary and those persecuted early Christians, the liturgy focused on peace and reconciliation – people's capacity to embrace inclusion and peace.

#### Baradene students recently journeyed to the World Schools Orienteering Championships in Brazil.

In August, 12 Year 9 and 10 students were selected to represent Baradene and New Zealand in Orienteering at the ISF U15 Gymnasiade 2023 in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. This multi-sport competition is organised by the International Schools Sports Federation (ISF) and runs like a mini-Olympics. With over 2,000 young athletes aged 13 to 15 from 44 countries around the globe competing in 18 sports disciplines, our students immersed themselves in an unforgettable experience, getting a taste of grand international sporting events.

The group was away for 10 days and had an incredibly full schedule, with three orienteering races, training days, opening and closing ceremonies, and cultural activities. The New Zealand team included boys from Mt Albert Grammar School, and on Nations Night, they performed a haka to a worldwide audience.

Highlights for our students included racing in a different environment, winning Gold in the Overall Teams event and three individual podium places, negotiating shirt swaps with other nations, and experiencing other cultures. They also enjoyed visiting the iconic Christ the Redeemer statue, Sugar Loaf Mountain via cable car (made famous by the James Bond movie *Moonraker*), and Copacabana Beach. The hotel had an amazing pool and was directly opposite the beach, which was well received during downtime between training days and competitions.

Overall, New Zealand ended up in eleventh place on the medal table (even though they only competed in one sport at the event!), and our students had a great time meeting athletes from all over the world.

Fortunately, Baradene stayed calm and composed to secure the win and a spot in the Grand Final against St Kentigern College.

The last game of a tournament is always challenging, but the Baradene team wouldn't let St Kent's dominate. Nearing



the end of the first half, Baradene had an opportunity to score with a corner kick. C tarting at a new school as a new international student Jin a foreign country, speaking a different language, and without your friends and family can often feel overwhelming, disorienting, and stressful. At Baradene, we feel strongly that making the transition to our school as smooth, enjoyable, and stress-free as possible positively impacts our students' ability to settle into their studies and new environment. We also believe that a smooth transition contributes favourably to academic performance, participation in extra-curricular activities, making friends with Kiwi students, and an overall sense of belonging to the Baradene community. We know that students who feel settled and happy from the beginning are more likely to be confident and capable of pursuing a wide range of school activities, making the most of what we have to offer, whether it be sport, music, volunteering, academic competitions, productions, dance, or drama.

Our three Year 13 International Student Leaders are the heart of the international student community at Baradene. These leaders play a vital role in creating a safe, fun, welcoming place for our new students. On Wednesday mornings, all international students meet with the International Dean, International Student Manager, and Homestay Co-ordinator. Every new international student is paired with an existing international student who speaks their language and is already familiar with the school. We believe this is important because it allows our new students to ask questions and share concerns in their own language.

During the weekly meetings, the International Council share school notices, say prayers, and play games. The International Council also organises social activities and outings during lunchtime and after school when students can socialise and have fun. This year, these have included FiaFia Cultural Night, Lunar New Year celebrations, a stall at La Fête, creative crafting in the Makerspace, movie Kahoots, and shared lunches. ## MUSIC ACADEMY

#### Introducing Baradene's new Music Academy, which began in May this year and is already making a positive difference for our musicians.

The Music Academy was established in May 2023 to improve the music literacy of our aspiring young musicians. The Academy is aimed at students in Years 9 to 13, and after its first month, had 18 enthusiastic participants. Taught by Baradene's Director of Choirs and music teacher, Rachel Young, the group comes together weekly to work on music theory, listening and reading skills, and music analysis. The content of the classes is adapted to suit the students' levels, with the group working together to collaborate on and improve their own goals; for example, songwriting, music reading, sight reading, and ensemble playing.

Music literacy involves reading and analysing music; this skill can open up a greater understanding when listening to and playing music. As well as improving and developing skills as a musician, students can find their reading skills improving and, in turn, the satisfaction they experience when playing in a group and learning with an instrumental teacher helps with their confidence in any subject.



#### Cats Production, June 2023

#### High School Musical 2 Jr, July 2023

10 of our students were cast in *High School Musical 2 Jr* with Geronimo Musicals. Geronimo is a Performing Arts school, and they produce musicals as an extension of their Musical Theatre Classes. Baradene had the highest involvement rate in this show, and it was inspiring to see 10 of our students shine on stage: Sophie Berrill and Grace Wessels (Year 7), Layla Gollings and Zoe Sekula (Year 8), Ruby Lonergan (Year 10), Bella Fogarty, Kiera Martin, Amalia Mazzaschi, Taylor Wessels (Year 11), and Emma Blackie (Year 12).

#### World of Dance Competition, April 2023

Jessica Kendrick-Jones, Samara Saunders, Sofia Bray (Year 11), and Gabrielle Copley (Year 12) represented Aotearoa at the World of Dance Competition in Orlando, Florida. Preparations were intense and included six months of daily rehearsals, but it was worth it as the girls achieved very high results. They danced in all five troupes, consisting of three jazz and two lyrical troupes, competing against 40 other countries to make it to the finals. They placed second in the world in their two jazz dances missing first place (against Team USA) by only 0.1! They placed sixth for their other three dances, and brought home three Nations Cups.





The Music Man in Concert, October 2023

Two of our Senior Drama students, Amélia Rojas (Year 13) and Gabrielle Copley (Year 12), successfully auditioned and were cast in the role of Zaneeta in *The Music Man in Concert* showing at the Kiri Te Kanawa Theatre. Featuring 24 big band songs, including the hit "Seventy-six Trombones", *The Music Man* is produced by the Amici Trust and G&T Productions.



#### Hip Hop International World Championships, August 2023

Over 300 hip-hop crews comprising over 3,000 competitors attended the Hip Hop International World Championships in Phoenix, Arizona. Kaley Prossler (Year 7) and her Junior Crew, Junior ID from IDCO, were the only Kiwis to make the finals, finishing sixth. Matilda Meredith (Year 8) and her Junior Crew, LYNX from RGD Studio, made it to the semi-finals and tied with two other crews for ninth place, officially placing 11th. These Junior Crew placings were out of 42 of the best Junior Crews in the world! Mary Meredith (Year 10) and her Adult Megacrew, Republic, made it to the semi-finals, placing 15th out of 46 Megacrews!

I was involved in a range of sports while I was a Baradene student, including netball, basketball, tennis, and squash. Sports provided me with many skills which benefited my post-college career. As a member of the Police, I worked with sporting organisations around youth participation, and I also started coaching netball. After a break and a change of careers, I resumed coaching Baradene's 8A netball team this year, and absolutely love it. Giving back is a no-brainer in sports – without this philosophy, sports would simply not be "for all". My daughter is in Year 8 and cannot wait to start coaching a junior team next year; she has already started umpiring, and part of the development of our athletes includes teaching them the importance of giving back to the sports that provide so much to them. Involvement in sports creates a sense of belonging, helps manage anxiety and stress, and plays a role in ensuring our girls have balance in their lives. Coaching is an opportunity to teach kids to be good human beings! Some of the biggest wins are not on the scoreboard, but what comes after the final whistle, and my focus is not just on netball but on ensuring the students all have a positive sporting experience which flows on to aspirations to give back to the next generation.

#### Prue Catton (Class of 2021), Football Coach

During my time at Baradene, I played various sports ranging from touch to frisbee, but ultimately my passions were cricket and football, in which I represented the school from Years 7 to 13. I am now in my second year coaching the Year 7/8 AIMS football team. Playing sports for Baradene holds some of my fondest memories, so being able to come back and be a part of other girls' memories is so special. Since I started at Baradene in Year 7, the school has gained a hockey turf, and a new gym is underway; as a cricketer and a footballer, I had to leave school grounds to train, so the benefits from having these new facilities for the girls coming through will be amazing. Coming back to coach has taught me a lot about myself. I am more patient than I thought I was, and I still have the desire and the energy to see Baradene succeed. At Baradene I was a part of some extraordinary teams, where I made great friends with whom I am still close today. I have played for many teams in my life, but the Baradene teams have always felt different; the team pride and sisterhood are very special.

#### Sarah Simpson (Class of 2020), Rowing Coach

Being involved in rowing at Baradene was one of my best decisions, helping me grow by building my confidence, encouraging me to push myself outside my comfort zone, and offering me many opportunities. I loved being part of the Baradene rowing community and enjoyed helping teach the Year 9 students each season at "Learn to Row" while I was at school. Giving back allows me to show my gratitude and appreciation for the sport at Baradene. It's very rewarding to see the girls grow and improve on and off the water, and I feel a massive sense of pride and fulfilment. The girls have taught me the importance of resilience; no matter their challenges, they stay positive and want to find ways to keep improving. They have also taught me how essential it is to be adaptable and patient, as things don't always go as planned, and I have learned to quickly adapt and be flexible, both on and off the water. ## The Board of Baradene College Ltd update us on the progress of the new gymnasium construction project.

Over the past few months, significant progress has been made on the new gymnasium complex. So far, the old gym has been demolished, the site stripped and excavated, and ground beams have been laid. At present, around 65% of the precast panels have been installed, waterproofing is being precast, in-ground services are being installed, and preparations are being made for the ground floor slab.



The new gymnasium complex is an exciting project for Baradene. It will provide students with opportunities to experience the positive impact of physical activity on their physical and mental health and performance in all aspects of school life. It will also encourage them to pursue and achieve sporting excellence.

Importantly, having modern indoor facilities for PE, fitness, sports trainings, and inter-school competitions will remove many of the barriers to students participating in school sport, such as time, transport, cost, or inclement weather.

The new gym complex, with its indoor courts, fitness centre, and café will become a vibrant hub of physical activity and social interaction for the entire Baradene community to enjoy.



## STUDENT GYM SITE VISIT

22 Year 12 and 13 Physics students and teachers visited the gym construction site. Head of Physics Allison Barrett reports.

After dressing up in safety gear, we were guided around the site by two of the architects, an engineer, and the project manager, who explained how this large project was designed and engineered. It was amazing to see the scale of the building as we stood in the middle of what will become the gym floor, with the walls now appearing above the foundations. Using a 3D app to view the design, it was possible for us to imagine how the facility will look when it is finished. We hope to be able to make further visits to the site as construction progresses.

We are very excited to see Baradene's new gymnasium complex rising out of the ground. In addition to providing a modern sporting complex appropriate for a college of our size, it will also include a fitness centre, new teaching spaces, and a student café.

The project has been planned for many years and is led and funded by

the Proprietor (Baradene College Limited or BCL). When combined with the hockey turf (completed in 2019), the finished gym complex will equip Baradene with sporting facilities of the highest standard, catering to our students' diverse sporting needs and going quite some way towards realising a focus in Baradene's strategic plan of "growing participation and the pursuit of excellence in sport".

Our goal is for every student to have the desire and means to access sporting opportunities – whether to become active, to take up a new sport or physical activity, to reach her sporting potential, or to pursue sporting excellence. To reach our goal we need the help of the Baradene community, present and past, to fund the fit out of the new building to the high standards we aspire to.

While BCL funds and manages the construction of the complex, the College takes financial responsibility for the fit out; the on-court gear and equipment required for a multitude of sports, specialist fitness centre equipment, audio visual technology and electronics, spectator bleachers, and the fit out of the café and surrounding areas. The total cost of the fit out has been budgeted and costed at just over \$1 million and the College is seeking to raise the funds required through a number of channels. One of the most important fundraising avenues is through our Foundation, Growing Heart. Growing Heart has recently run our second annual Baradene Giving Week, an online campaign which aimed to raise a significant sum towards the goal. We were so pleased to see donations come in from the wider Baradene community - parents, grandparents, alumnae and friends of Baradene, and we thank each and every one of those generous donors for supporting this campaign.

## **REST IN PEACE**

Sister Christine Dorothea Hewlett RSCJ passed away in June 2023 at the age of 93.



In her eulogy, Sister Dot was described as a "*civis mundi*, a citizen of the world, a master of the English language, fluent in French, competent in Italian and Spanish, with a reading knowledge of Latin and Greek. She also taught herself Croatian and te reo Māori." Born in Malta in 1930, she grew up in the United Kingdom. Her father died when she was very young,

and Dorothea and her mother moved many times. She first came into contact with the Society of the Sacred Heart when she attended Craiglockhart in Edinburgh. On leaving school, Dorothea moved to Sydney with her mother, arriving by flying boat shortly after her 17th birthday. Dorothea began studying at the University of Sydney. One night she attended a midnight mass at the Rose Bay Convent, during which she experienced a strong sense of calling. In 1950, Dorothea began her Noviceship at Rose Bay and made her vows in August 1952. Professed in 1958, Sister Dorothea became a teacher at Stuartholme in Brisbane. After two years she went to Duchesne College to complete her Bachelor of Arts degree, becoming fluent in a number of European languages, and returned there a few years later to complete her Diploma in Education. Sister Dorothea then taught at Kincoppal and Rose Bay, Sydney and Sacré Coeur, Melbourne.

Due to her knowledge of languages, Sister Dorothea twice spent periods of time at the Society's Mother House in Rome doing translation. She moved to Baradene in 1997 to become the Society's Archivist. For many years, Sister Dorothea was one of a small community in the cottage in the grounds of Baradene, and her cat was always a valued member of her community. She retired to the convent at Baradene but continued to read widely. Sister Dorothea was a cherished member of the Sacred Heart Sisters in Australia and New Zealand.

Most recently, Jadyn has been offered trainee positions for professional companies in America and junior companies in Europe, and we look forward to learning where her career will take her next.

### Chloe Bagayas (Class of 2017) graduated from The University of Auckland with a BA in Screen Production and Drama.

Chloe works in the film and theatre industry. Her training and experience make her very versatile, and she switches between acting, directing, and stage management with ease. She is keen to try everything, and has recently taken up vocal coaching. This "portfolio style" career is the norm in the creative industry, and is one of the reasons Chloe loves her work so much. In the last few years, Chloe has worked with Proudly Asian Theatre, Massive Theatre, Seed Theatre Company, and is a member of the 2023 Auckland Theatre Youth Company. ## DAME HELENE QUILTER DNZM QSO

"I am committed to achieving diversity in our workplaces and organisations and particularly ensuring women are represented at every leadership level. I've worked hard to provide and shape opportunities for women to succeed."

### Our 2023 Alumnae Meritae Award Winner Dame Helene Quilter (née Syben, Class of 1971) has truly lived the values and passions instilled at Baradene.

The Meritae Award pays tribute to an alumna who has embraced the philosophy of the Sacred Heart in their everyday life, and Dame Helene is delighted and honoured to receive this year's award. "It means so much to me. Baradene had a profound influence on me, and that experience set me on my path for a career in public service."

Helene attended Baradene as a boarder from 1966 until 1971. She was especially inspired by her former principal, Sister Anne O'Rourke RSCJ, who believed in educating women to a high standard and impressed upon them the importance of having a profession. At Baradene, Helene was taught to care for people, be compassionate, have empathy, be courageous, and strive for excellence. These values remained with Helene and were instrumental in her entering public service.

Baradene was also formative in developing her love of New Zealand contemporary art. Helene collected art from her early 20s, and established the Quilter Collection (1998-2014) at Govett-Brewster Art Gallery/Len Lye Centre in New Plymouth. She has since sold most of that collection, and her focus is now on collecting old and contemporary religious art.



Dame Helene served in the public service for 45 years. She commenced her career in the Department of Social Welfare, rising to senior leadership levels including National Director Income Support Programmes and Services, and Chief Negotiator Bi-Lateral Social Security Agreements. Later she was appointed Deputy Chief Executive at the Ministry of Social Development, holding roles in national operations and in corporate and governance. During this time she completed her Masters in Strategic Studies at Victoria University in Wellington. Dame Helene continued her career with the State Services Commission, working with chief executives in the Justice and National Security sectors.



In 2012, Dame Helene was appointed as Secretary and Chief Executive of Defence, the first woman to hold this significant role. In 2019, she was appointed by the Prime Minister as the Statutory Deputy Public Service Commissioner, one of the most important roles in the public service.

Dame Helene was also a long-standing member of the Board of Diversity Works New Zealand, championing workplace diversity, equity, and inclusion in the workplace, and working on gender pay gap issues. Throughout her career, Dame Helene was committed to achieving greater diversity and gender balance throughout workplaces and in chief executive positions.

Dame Helene's advice to young career women is to do lots of different things, in various roles and organisations, to broaden their experience. Echoing her Baradene values, she says it is important to care about people, be ambitious for change, and build collaborative, strong, engaged cultures.

Aside from her commitment to public service, Dame Helene has remained passionate not only about the visual arts, but also performance art. She is currently Deputy Chair of the Board of the New Zealand School of Dance.

In the King's Birthday and Coronation Honours 2023, Dame Helene was made a Dame Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to the public service and the arts. In 2019, Helene was appointed a Companion of the Queen's Service Order for services to the State, and she also won the 2019 Wellingtonian of the Year Award in the public service category.

## LUCY BURRELL

## Lucy Burrell (Class of 2020) has had an amazing rowing season overseas.

In 2021, Lucy left Auckland for California after winning a full scholarship to attend Stanford University as part of the Women's Rowing Team. Lucy has just finished her sophomore year and is going into her junior year at Stanford majoring in a Science, Technology and Society degree.

Lucy rowed in five seat for the Stanford 1st Varsity Crew. In May, Lucy's crew ended the Varsity season in style, winning the Division 1 final at the NCAA Rowing Championships in Pennsauken, New Jersey, beating all other crews and thus becoming National Champions.

This was a huge win, and eagle-eyed viewers may have seen the piece on Lucy being presented with her award alongside her Stanford crew members on TVNZ's *1News*. You can read an article about Lucy and other Kiwi women rowers who had success in this competition at bit.ly/3P1fmmw

The win by the 1st Varsity rowing eight helped Stanford claim the points trophy for the regatta for just the second time in its history. The excitement didn't end there, as Stanford also won the Director's Cup, the trophy for the best sports college across America. It's the 26th time Stanford has won the Cup, which has been presented since 1994.

However, Lucy's season was not quite finished, as in June she took part as a USA-based New Zealand athlete in the NZ U23 trial in California, the first ever U23 trial for USA-based athletes.

Then in July, having made the team, she traveled to Plovdiv, Bulgaria to take part in the 2023 World Rowing Under 23 Championships. Lucy rowed as part of the Women's Coxed Four which won the Silver medal, New Zealand's first medal at the Championships. They finished just a second behind Australia, the defending world champions, and beat the USA, who received Bronze.

This was another incredible result, and one which saw Lucy smash a short-term goal she set for herself when she left Baradene – to make a NZ U23 team.

We wish Lucy well with her long-term goal to represent New Zealand in the elite team at the Olympics. Lucy's Baradene community is behind her all the way!

Lucy's younger sister Harriet Burrell (Year 13) is also making waves with rowing. This year, Harriet rowed in several Baradene crews, including the U18 Coxed Eight and the Coxless Pair, with both crews winning first place at the Head of the Harbour Regatta and third in the North Island Secondary Schools Rowing Championships. Harriet is also in the New Zealand Under 19 Development Junior Squad and is an Auckland Rowing representative with the Open Blues team.

We'll be keeping an eye out for these sisters as they row their way to national and international success.

The Auckland City Mission – Te Tāpui Atawhai, stands with Aucklanders in greatest need, advocating for suitable homes, nutritious food, and accessible healthcare to enable long term wellbeing. The Mission has been operating for over 100 years, and its services have evolved along with the city's needs. At the beginning of 2022, the Mission opened a new building, HomeGround, which brings together permanent housing, expanded health and social services, addiction withdrawal facilities, and community programmes.

Baradene alumnae and sisters Nicola and Courtney Bowden work at the Mission, responding with care and compassion in their roles.

Nicola has a Degree in Psychology and Criminology from the University of Auckland. She has been working at the Mission for five years, and has been Supportive Services Manager for HomeGround Apartments for 18 months. When Nicola first started work at the Mission, she was part of the Outreach service, working directly on the streets with people experiencing homelessness.

Nicola says, "With the establishment of HomeGround, we have 80 apartments which provide permanent housing to people from diverse backgrounds, some of whom have experienced chronic homelessness, poverty, and trauma. We offer a 24/7 wraparound support service that is personcentered and prioritises culture, connection, and hauora (wellness). The community development is also a really valuable aspect of the mahi which fosters a space of belonging and empowerment.

"One of the best things about HomeGround Apartments is the intensive level of support that we offer, because it has real value for the people living here in supporting them to sustain their tenancy. In my previous roles at the Mission, the people I worked alongside were cycling through the broken system for years and generations. Some of those same people are now living and thriving in the HomeGround Apartments,

connecting with whānau and community, accessing life-saving healthcare, returning to mahi or study – the list goes on."

Nicola is particularly passionate about working with our rangatahi experiencing homelessness. Nicola has previously held the rangatahi portfolio and works closely with Manaaki Rangatahi, a collective of agencies working together to end youth homelessness in Aotearoa.

Like her sister before her, Courtney's role as Outreach Key Worker involves providing services to assist individuals and families move from homelessness, housing instability, or emergency housing to more permanent accommodation. This is challenging work assisting those living with the effects of trauma, abuse, addiction, violence, mental health, and poverty issues. Courtney's role is to address and improve their mental, physical, and spiritual wellbeing by connecting them with services that will provide a more stable life and, when possible, to reconnect them with whānau.

Courtney has worked with the Mission for three-and-a-half years, and is part of a diverse team of social service, health, and peer support practitioners who do street outreach, advocacy, case management, housing, and tenancy support. This includes working with people who are living on the street, finding and assisting those who need help. Sometimes solutions are found quickly, but often it can take many years of dedicated support, which can continue even after a person is housed.

Courtney says, "Being out on community outreach daily, I get to connect with new and old faces, and building these relationships is what brings me to mahi every day. Gaining people's trust and hearing their stories is a privilege that enables me to provide appropriate and necessary support."

Both Nicola and Courtney feel privileged to be able to do work so closely aligned with their personal values, helping the team at the Mission have a positive impact on the lives of some of the most marginalised people in our community. The work can be challenging, heartbreaking, and difficult, but some of the outcomes are incredibly uplifting and rewarding.

We remember the alumnae and members of the Baradene community who have recently passed.

Robin Rive (née Allen, Class of 1956) died on 11 May 2023. Robin was much loved by her family, her husband Bryan, her children and grandchildren, who adored her "quirky sense of humour, creative talent, and inimitable style." Robin attended Baradene with her sister Gabrielle Wilkin (neé Allen, Class of 1954) and remembered her Baradene years fondly.
