State-of-the-art gymnasium takes shape

We are very excited about the mid-year opening of the new gymnasium complex, which will be a game-changer for our students. With its flexible teaching spaces, improved changing facilities, and a purpose-built cafeteria with covered outdoor seating, the new facility isn't just about physical fitness. Whether during sports events, PE classes, fitness training, or casual conversations in the cafeteria, students, staff, and parents will have opportunities to come together. Again, we extend our sincere gratitude to the property committee of Baradene College Limited, who have worked tirelessly to kickstart this significant project. While we eagerly await the gymnasium's completion, we appreciate the community's patience, especially our students and staff who have weathered the disruptions associated with new construction.

Celebrating academic excellence

We are very proud of Baradene's 2023 academic results, which included 97.8% of our students achieving university entrance, and the awarding of 49 Scholarships. Importantly, success is reflected across the board, with the majority of students excelling in NCEA by endorsing with either Excellence or Merit at all levels. These results are a credit to the students and the staff, who are committed to enabling our students to achieve at high levels. It is impressive that our students balance these achievements with active participation in a diverse range of extra-curricular activities. It is unsurprising that a recently published Australian study confirms links between long-term participation in sport and increased academic performance, reduced absenteeism, and the likelihood of attending university.

35 years of the Baradene Art Show

This year, Baradene College will host its 35th annual Art Show, which has become a highlight of our calendar. The Art Show showcases the incredible talent of New Zealand artists. It is always well-attended and provides an opportunity to foster connections between our wider community and the College. The board appreciates the dedication of a team of volunteers who work extremely hard to make this event such a success.

2024 promises to be an exciting year, and we look forward to the opportunities ahead for welcoming our community to the school.

Our students returned after the summer holidays full of purpose, and we hope new students and their families have enjoyed their first term as members of the Baradene community.

Reflecting on highlights from Term 1, in February, we celebrated the start of the new school year at our beautiful Opening Mass, and students enjoyed taking part in sporting competition at our Swimming Sports and Athletics Day. Students across all year levels had enormous fun gathering to compete in the annual House Parades, which always provide a colourful, joyous, and entertaining start to the year.



Focus goal

The Sacred Heart focus goal for this year is "The Building of Community as a Christian Value". At Baradene it is our sense of community that makes our school a special place for all. We are a school of the Sacred Heart, and part of a global network of Sacred Heart schools around Australasia and the world. Closer to home we greatly value our school community of fellow staff and students, the RSCJ Sisters who live on site in the Baradene Convent, and the school community of parents, caregivers, and families.

This Issue of *Baradene Heart* magazine has the theme "Whiria te tāngata," a Maori proverb meaning to "Weave the people together," which reflects this year's focus goal. At Baradene we aim to "weave" people together to make

a co-operative school community which ensures Baradene students continue to flourish year on year.

Another related proverb is "Nāu te rourou nāku te rourou ka ora ai te iwi" – "With your basket and my basket the people will thrive." This proverb reiterates how important it is for us all to be part of the community, to bring our skills to the table, and share our resources and knowledge for the betterment of all. Many of our parents and caregivers take an active interest in the school by volunteering to be on our Boards, the PTA, to assist with fundraising events such as the annual Baradene Art show, or to coach sports teams and cultural groups. We also foster a strong connection with our alumnae, many of whom retain a strong association with Baradene throughout their lives, and who are an inspiration to current students. We are truly blessed to have this supportive network, as it enriches the educational experience enjoyed by our students, and we encourage you all to become involved in the Baradene community.

The "basket" or "kete" metaphor can be extended further to describe the importance of our extended Christian community in the context of our identity as a Sacred Heart school. At Baradene we draw from the wisdom of three kete which inform all we do:

1. *Scripture and the life of Jesus.*
2. *Heritage and charism of the Society of the Sacred Heart.*
3. *The lived tradition of the Church.*

When students come to Baradene College, they become a member of our school family, and beyond that, we all form part of the great family of the Church.

Not only do we value and build community within Baradene, we also ensure our students use their faith to build community outside of the school gates. As part of their Religious Education studies, our girls learn to place themselves in the wider community; by learning about

social justice and thinking of the plight of others, supporting charities in New Zealand and overseas, and volunteering to assist those in need. The sense of being an active part of the wider community, and the reward and responsibility that brings, is reinforced in Year 11 when students take part in our Social Awareness Programme.

Academic success

Our interim 2023 NCEA results were outstanding, with 99.5% passing NCEA Level 1, 98.9% passing NCEA Level 2, and 98.9% passing NCEA Level 3. On average, over the three levels of NCEA, 99.1% of students passed their respective NCEA level, over 52% of students had their NCEA certificates endorsed with Excellence, and 87% of students had their NCEA certificates endorsed with Excellence or Merit. Many students received multiple Excellence Subject Endorsements, including a number who received Excellence Subject Endorsements in all their subjects. Additionally, 97.8% of students gained University Entrance.

Scholarship numbers were also high. Baradene received 49 Scholarships, with five of those being Outstanding Scholarships. Five Scholarships were received by Year 11 students and 17 were received by Year 12 students. Two Baradene students received a Scholarship Award for receiving three or more Scholarships each, and one of our students, Jorgia Roberts, received an Outstanding Scholar Award, achieving four Scholarships, with two of those being Outstanding Scholarships.

As a cohort, our students continue to achieve at the highest level, and this is due to the commitment our students give to their studies and the dedication and support provided by their teachers, parents, and caregivers. The *NZ Herald* recently released an article on school performance based on



2022 NCEA results showing Baradene as the top girls' school with the highest number of NCEA Level 3 (or above) passes at 95.1%, and the highest University Entrance pass rate at 92.6%. It is pleasing that our 2023 results are even better.

NCEA update

Recently there have been a number of media stories about schools choosing to offer alternative methods of assessment to their students, other than NCEA. Although we are introducing our own Baradene Year 11 Certificate this year instead of offering NCEA Level 1, we will reassess our Year 11 course as new resources for NCEA Level 1 are developed by the Ministry of Education.

Overall, Baradene remains committed to NCEA, as it is aligned to New Zealand's National Curriculum, and we believe it is important for our students to leave school with a New Zealand qualification. NCEA has served us very well in the past, with our students receiving a high rate of acceptance into competitive courses such as Law, Medicine, and Engineering at New Zealand universities, and being accepted at overseas universities including Harvard and Oxford. At present, we believe our students continue to be well catered for by NCEA.

Continued participation in sport is important

Baradene students have a high rate of participation in sport across all years, over many codes, and accommodating differing levels of ability. As our BOT Chair, Gill Chappell, has mentioned, the importance of encouraging students to play sport was highlighted in a recent study by the University of Sydney. The study found that students who are long-term participants in sport have increased academic performance, better attention and memory, less absenteeism, and are more likely to attend university, with these links being particularly true for those who participate in team sports.

Requiescat in pace

The school community, especially the students in her year, were greatly saddened by the loss of Sara Hepple, a Year 9 student in 2023, who passed away over the summer holidays. In early February, we held a liturgy for our Year 10 students to remember Sara, and we continue to pray for Sara, and for her family and friends.

In February, we were also very sad to lose Sister Margaret D'Ath RSCJ, who passed away at 99 years of age. Sister D'Ath was a well-respected teacher at Baradene and several other Sacred Heart schools for many years, a past Principal of Loreto Hall, and a much loved and long-standing member of the Baradene Convent.

New gymnasium project

Excitement is growing as we get closer to the completion of our new gymnasium complex. The gymnasium and cafeteria will be an incredible resource for our students to enjoy as part of Baradene's campus. We need to raise funds to complete the fit out of this wonderful new facility and our Giving Week this year will be held in June for this purpose. COUNSELLING

Our new Head of Counselling shares what makes her role, and the help her team provides, so important.

Tell us about your background and career trajectory.

I am a people person, and a big softie. But I am also a strong advocate for social justice and helping people find their voice. I grew up on the North Shore, but have lived and worked all over Auckland, as well as living in New York and Vancouver for a time. I went to The University of Auckland from school, but the timing for study wasn't right for me and I found myself called to the New Zealand Police, where I had an amazing and varied career. My experiences in the Police highlighted the importance of education, and this led me to pursue studies towards becoming a primary school teacher. I found myself called again to really step into my nurturing role and studied once more to become a counsellor, completing my Master of Counselling with First Class Honours. I absolutely love my job. Everything I have done and experienced throughout life and my varied career has shaped and armed me wonderfully to be able to offer understanding, support, strategies and care in the counselling space – and I truly feel privileged and honoured when people enter the counselling space and share their real selves with me.

What made you become a school counsellor?

My career hats have changed considerably, but they always involved working with people – policing, teaching, and now counselling lovely souls. I have seen the positive impact an education can have on a person, and with life getting more complicated and busy, the issues students now face that may distract them from their learning are unfortunately plentiful. I love seeing the change in students as they leave the office so much lighter and happier, ready and able to take on the challenges of school and life.

Why do you think it's essential for counsellors to be on staff at school?

It is so important to have counsellors at a school – teachers are amazing at what they do, but they can't do it all, and that's

where the school counsellor can help. When students are struggling with personal issues, it is critical that they receive the right support and guidance to help get them back on track and happy, both in the classroom and life in general.

What do you think is important for students to know about Baradene's counselling service?

It is completely confidential. Parents and teachers are not told about what is shared in the sacred counselling space, unless there is an emergency, or you (the student) agree it is best for them.

What are some common concerns or issues you might deal with as a counselling staff? What can you help with?

Stress, anxiety, friendship breakups, home/life issues... We can support you through anything and everything if you want us to. We can offer tips and strategies on how to keep the stress and anxiety at bay, manage breakups and all sorts of hard-to-talk-about emotions. When life knocks you down, we help pick you up and get you feeling great again.

What advice do you have for students when it comes to their mental health and wellbeing?

Don't struggle alone! It is scary reaching out to someone, but I guarantee you will feel better afterward and, more importantly, you won't feel like you are all on your own going through a tough time. You are NEVER a burden, and we all deserve love and happiness in this life.

READING MATTERS

Library Manager Claudine Crabtree highlights the importance of libraries in schools.

Kia ora! Nau mai ki te whare pukapuka. Welcome to the library! I have been the Library Manager for the past five years and love being a school librarian. It is the best job in the world! Our library team includes the wonderful Annie Triggs, whom I have the joy of working with every day, and the fabulous Charlotte Gehin, who works one day a week with us. We also have a fantastic team of student librarians from Years 11 to 13 who help out before and after school and during breaks.



Nine months ago, I was elected to the role of President of the School Library Association of New Zealand Aotearoa. I was honoured and excited to be Manukura and raise the profile of and highlight the challenges facing school libraries in New Zealand. SLANZA (slanza.org.nz) has 500 members across Aotearoa, who are passionate about empowering and supporting school library staff, and strengthening and promoting school libraries.

Unfortunately, two-thirds of New Zealand schools do not have a school library staffed by a librarian, with a quality collection of online and print resources. There is a proven and well-researched link between school libraries and literacy rates, so with the declining literacy rate in New Zealand, it is difficult to understand why there isn't a library in every school. Having a library staffed by librarians in all schools to encourage students to read and learn for life is essential.

Baradene's Library, thanks to the support of the Board and Senior Leadership Team, is well-staffed, well-resourced, and fully supported. Located on the third floor of the Duchesne building, our students, staff, and wider community are blessed to have a library at the heart of our school, designed to nurture a love for reading and learning. We are not only part of the school community, but also an important environment for community building.

Everyone is welcome here; we invite staff and students in, hosting book clubs, author visits, events, competitions, classes from all subjects, and the wider Baradene community. The library is a beautiful third space, neither a classroom nor a home; it is a haven for some, a place of discovery for others, where you can learn to better understand yourself, each other, and the world. Hari panui! Keep reading!

ARCHIVE TREASURES

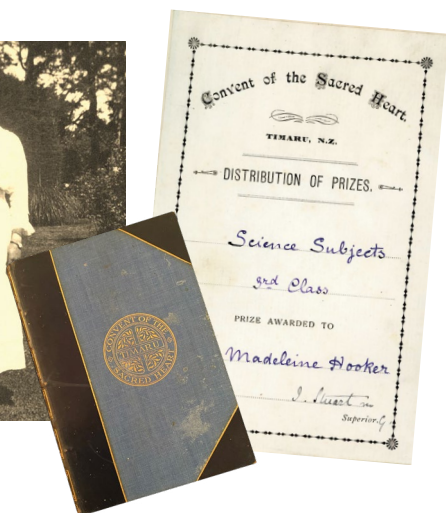
Our Archivist Yolande van de Wetering shares some unique treasures donated by alumnae.

Baradene is part of the worldwide Sacred Heart community, but closer to home, we are affiliated with three schools in Australia. In New Zealand, we are the only Sacred Heart school remaining after Sacré Cœur Timaru (1880-1935), Cottesmore College (1963-1976), and Erskine College (1905-1985) sadly closed down. We are very lucky to have some special pieces from alumnae who attended those schools.

Maida Coxhead (née Hooker), who attended Timaru in the early 20th century, donated items from her personal archive. This collection contains copies of photos and also *The History of Richard Raynal* by RH Benson, awarded to her as a science prize and signed by Janet Erskine Stuart RSCJ, who visited New Zealand in 1913/1914. Maida was an accomplished pianist and became a music teacher.

We are fortunate to have a school newspaper, *Le Trait d'Union*, produced by pupils of Erskine during World War I. This newspaper was handwritten in French and illustrated with the most beautiful drawings. Most of the pupils had a very good grasp of French as they were taught by French-speaking RSCJ Sisters.

Part of our collection is a family Bible, dating from around 1880, with a gold embossed leather cover and pages where the births, deaths, and marriages of the members of the McHardy family were recorded. The last recorded date was 1941. Father Emmett McHardy was a frequent visitor to "Remuera" (as Baradene was known) in the 1920s. Father McHardy died of disease at age 28 in 1933, after he was sent to Bougainville, Papua New Guinea, to open a primary school. We assume the Bible came to the Archives via his sister Margaret, who was a pupil here.

We also have crockery with the school emblem that was "souvenired" by boarders just before our boarding school closed down in 1984. The girls smuggled plates and cups hidden under their uniforms out of the dining room. It's amazing that these pupils had the sense, at such a young age, that history has to be preserved at all costs!

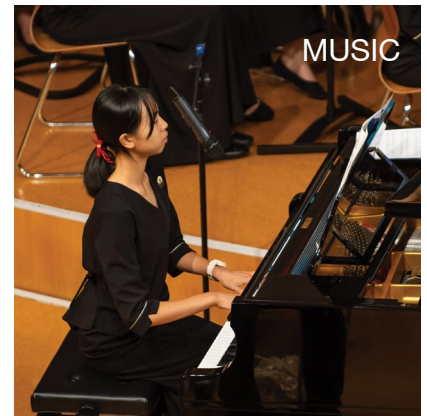
The event also served as an opportunity to raise money for the trip, and enabled Baradene to purchase instruments to gift to a school in need. Caroline Harris, our dedicated Music Administrator, and Richard Neunzerling, who led the Fundraising Committee, played an essential part in making this journey successful. Their tireless efforts in organising fundraising activities and catering for the *Sim Kio* concert played a crucial role in the tour's realisation.

Richard also brought his charisma to the event as the MC, alongside Year 13 student Kirstin Skeet, making the concert even more memorable. With the support of the tour group's families and the wider school community, the Fundraising Committee was able to raise over \$10,000 to put toward the costs of the trip, purchasing gifts for the host families and schools in Taiwan and Japan, and the gift of new instruments for a rural school in Lukang, Taiwan.

The experiences gained over the last few months will have a lasting impact on these young musicians, enriching their lives and furthering their musical journeys. The Baradene College community is incredibly proud of their achievements, and looks forward to more opportunities to share their music with the world. We will report on this exciting trip in our October 2024 issue of *Baradene Heart*.

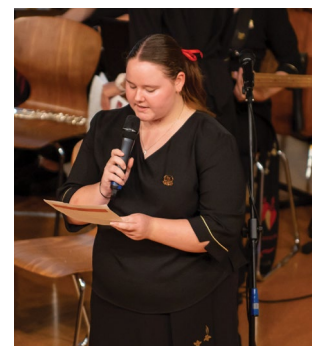

One term of the programme is dedicated to in-school sessions accompanied by community visits to rest homes, primary schools, and recreational facilities for older adults and people with disabilities, to name a few. The importance of these weekly initiatives can be seen in the development of relationships within the community, and the reflection and personal growth that takes place as a result.

Each Wednesday morning, taxi vans, parent vehicles, and school vans depart from Gate 1, transporting our keen participants to 15 different venues! The support of our parent drivers is essential and enriches the programme. We have captured some of their thoughts about their involvement.



I wanted to help with driving for the Social Awareness Programme to be involved in serving the school community and to demonstrate that service is sometimes a sacrifice and commitment of our time and energy.

It has been wonderful to hear the student group I have taken to St Andrew's Village discussing their experiences each week. Some of these have included their reflection of how it has been such a wholesome experience talking to older people about their many and various life experiences.

I have been impressed with the students' confidence and energy each week, and I am sure the St Andrew's Village group will be enjoying these regular visits from the Baradene girls.

As Baradene’s incredible new gymnasium complex nears completion, we look back on the rapid progress made over the last year.

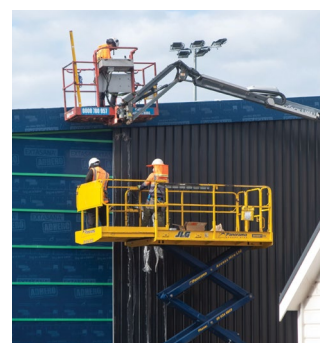
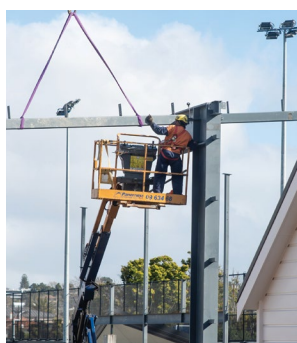
It is amazing to think that this time last year, the construction of the new gymnasium complex was only just getting underway. The old gym was demolished at the beginning of May 2023, and since then, building has accelerated quickly.

On site, the school community has witnessed the transformation as major earthworks were undertaken, followed by the installation of the precast panels, roof, wall and ceiling framing, services, joinery, and insulation. We are now in the home stretch as exterior cladding, interior linings, the installation of the lift, and the final finishing touches are being completed, including the hard landscaping of walls, stairs and bleachers.

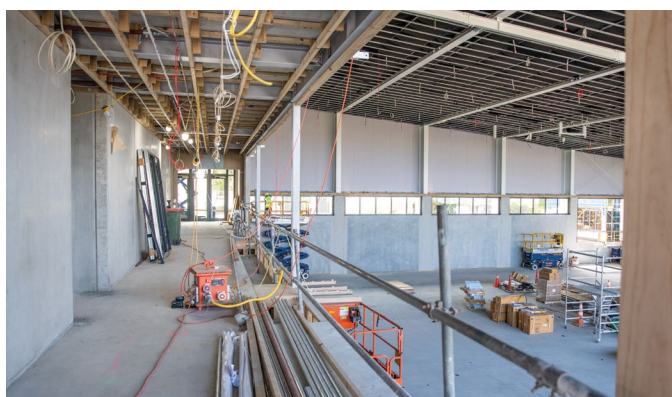
The project has proceeded on schedule, and with construction nearly complete, excitement is growing as we realise what an amazing new resource the gymnasium complex will bring to our campus, with its double gymnasium with spectator seating, fitness centre, cafeteria with commercial kitchen, and classrooms. Before we can make full use of the new facilities, we need to fit them out with the necessary sports, fitness, electronics, and kitchen equipment. In June we will be holding our 2024 Giving Week to raise funds for this purpose. Please read more about our Giving Week on page 38.

Baradene's Tennis programme has grown over the past decade through the efforts of a passionate and dedicated Head Coach.

Craig Bell has been the Head Coach of Tennis at Baradene for 11 years. He brings a wealth of knowledge and qualifications, including Tennis Australia/Tennis New Zealand (TNZ) Coach, TNZ L1 Competition Coach, International Tennis Federation (ITF) L1 Junior Development Coach, ITF L2 Club Professional Coach, and High Performance TNZ Coach. He is also currently the Vice President of Tennis New Zealand. Over the past 29 years, Craig has been fortunate to work



with players at the Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP), World Tennis Association (WTA), International Tennis Federation (ITF), and New Zealand representative levels. Craig was also involved in the development of TNZ Junior Players of the Year Sebastian Lavie and Claudia Williams.

Craig believes the true test of a great coach is to be able to coach all types of people, of all ages and abilities, while staying up-to-date with current international coaching techniques.

On court, Craig helps our students with technical and tactical coaching in a relaxed or competitive environment, depending on the students' goals. Craig's continued support, positive energy, and knowledge have created a warm environment for Baradene's tennis players.



Tennis continues to be a popular sport at Baradene. In Term 1, it is open to students in Years 7 to 13, and in Term 4, it is open to students in Years 7 to 10. In Term 1 this year, four Senior and four Junior teams entered the College Sport competition. Our top team, the Senior A team, plays on Wednesdays after school in the Senior A grade, while the other teams play on Saturday mornings at various Auckland venues.

ALUMNAE CUP TOURNAMENT

In September 2023, 10 students competed in the Alumnae Cup in Melbourne. The Alumnae Cup provides an opportunity for the Sacred Heart schools in the ANZNet province to not only compete against each other, but also to continue building relationships between students and staff. Baradene competes against Kincoppal-Rose Bay (Sydney), Sacré Cœur (Melbourne), and Stuartholme (Brisbane) in singles and doubles matches. We were fortunate to play at Melbourne's top facilities, including Albert Park Tennis Centre and Melbourne Park. The girls played exceptionally well in sweltering 26°C conditions. Baradene won both the A and B grades and made many friends along the way.

Ritorya Tamilo (Class of 2023) is a basketball sensation who recently joined the 2degrees Tall Ferns. Here she tells us more about her sporting career and what it's like playing basketball at the highest level.

When and where did you start playing basketball?

I started playing basketball when I moved to Baradene in Year 7. I had made the Year 7/8B team, and we had Thursday night games down at St Kentigern Boys' School every week. We played against the boys and often lost by a lot, but it was an extremely fun environment.

What part did your family play in getting you involved in basketball?

I am the first in my family to play basketball. Both my parents were volleyballers, so it was a new sport for them to take on too. However, they encouraged me to try out for the Auckland representative teams and would sign me up for different training camps to help me develop my skills.

What position do you like playing best?

Travelling to China and playing against some of the best teams in the world was a surreal experience that I am thankful I got to be a part of.

What's some good advice you have received from a coach or teammate over the years?

Good advice that I have received over the years is to have a “next play” mentality. This means to focus on the next play or next move instead of pondering on mistakes you might have made.

What is some good advice you would give to other young women who want to play sport?

The advice I'd give to other girls/young women playing sports is to work hard. All sports require time and effort to improve your skills. In saying this, make sure you're also having fun. Enjoy the game and the journey.

Sister Shanahan's career has encompassed multiple

leadership roles within the Society of the Sacred Heart, at Sancta Sophia College and at Kincoppal-Rose Bay School of the Sacred Heart, where she has been a Director of the School Board. She was Provincial of the Society in Australia and New Zealand for five years, and was called to Rome to be on the

General Council for six years. She has served as both Vice Principal and Principal of Sancta Sophia College within the University of Sydney. Sister Shanahan is currently involved in spiritual formation at Kincoppal-Rose Bay and Sancta Sophia. She is well-loved by all those she works with, including staff, parents, and students. Her presence as an RSCJ is of great significance, demonstrating that the charism of Sacred Heart education is wholly contemplative and wholly active.

REST IN PEACE

Sister Margaret D'Ath RSCJ passed away on 5 February 2024 at the age of 99.

Margaret D'Ath and her twin sister Joan were born in Otaki on 30 June 1924. As a baby, Margaret contracted a mild form of polio and was sent to hospital in Rotorua for treatment, where she remained until she was two. Polio left her with a limp, but despite this impediment, she enjoyed a vigorous and carefree childhood with her siblings, roaming the countryside among hills, rivers, and beaches, often on their bikes.

Margaret attended the local convent school and determined at the age of five to become a nun. For her secondary education she was sent to board at Sacré Cœur, Island Bay,



later known as Erskine College. Margaret loved Erskine – its ethos, its sense of internationality, the kindness of the RSCJ Sisters, and the classic arts-based curriculum. After an initial period during which she admitted to being “very bold” and pushing boundaries, Margaret settled down. She remained at Erskine for five years and was Head Girl for two consecutive years.

After leaving school, Margaret worked for a short time in Wellington. Then in 1942, with Japanese submarines lurking in Sydney Harbour, she travelled by flying boat to Rose Bay



and entered the Noviceship there, taking to religious life like a duck to water. After completing an Arts degree at Sancta Sophia College within Sydney University, and following Probation in Rome in 1951, Sister D'Ath began 10 happy years at the Sacred Heart schools of Kincoppal-Rose Bay, Baradene, and Erskine, teaching Religion, History, Maths, and Languages. She was well respected as an extraordinarily gifted, resourceful, and thorough teacher.

In the 1960s Sister D'Ath was a lecturer, then Principal, at Loreto Hall Teachers' Training College. She then spent two years on the staff at Christ College in Melbourne, returning to New Zealand in the early 1970s to become a primary schools' adviser, touring the Auckland diocese from Hokianga to Taumarunui. The mid-70s brought unsettled times with the changes of Vatican II, and after a time of further study and renewal overseas, she returned to teaching, this time at Woldingham, a Sacred Heart school in Surrey, England.

In the early 1980s, Sister D'Ath came back to New Zealand for the final time, and worked for many years in the Catholic Education Office in Wellington and Christchurch. Sister D'Ath was the local Superior for the RSCJ Sisters at Baradene Convent from 1999 to 2001. She later trained in Canon Law and worked in the Auckland Diocesan Tribunal until well into her 80s. For a number of years she was a member of a small community in Massey, before returning to Baradene.

Sister Margaret D'Ath was much-loved by her fellow Sisters and all in the Baradene community, and by her extended family. Her nieces and nephews visited her regularly and described their “Aunt Peg” as full of life, with her clever brain always so active, her sense of humour always to the fore, and with a non-judgmental attitude of love and fairness. She will also be remembered fondly by the students she taught at Baradene, many of whom she continued to keep in touch with over the years.

Unfortunately not all educational initiatives are able to be financed by parent contributions or by the Ministry of Education, so there is a real need for fundraising for projects such as these.

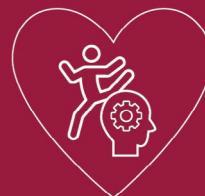

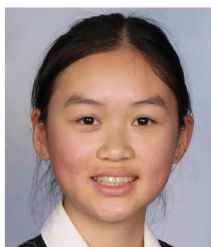

ERSKINE CHAPEL

In October 2023, Erskine Chapel was reopened as an event space after a thoughtful refurbishment project.

Opened in 1906, Erskine College (also known as the Convent of the Sacred Heart Island Bay, Sacré Cœur Island Bay, or simply Island Bay) was one of the four schools established by the Society of the Sacred Heart in New Zealand and was, together with Baradene, a member of ANZNet, the Australian New Zealand Network of Sacred Heart schools, up until its closure in 1985. Erskine College was designed by notable Wellington architect John Sydney Swan, who also later designed the Erskine Chapel, which was built adjoining the main convent during 1929-1930. Erskine Chapel is considered to be New Zealand's finest French Gothic-style chapel, and is listed as a Heritage New Zealand Category 1 Historic Place. The Chapel's wonderful acoustics have attracted many musicians of note over the years, including the Vienna Boys' Choir.

Many Baradene pupils spent time at Erskine, particularly due to the Helen's Trophy (pictured below), an annual competition between the New Zealand Sacred Heart schools: Baradene, Erskine, and Cottesmore, with a number of events including netball, volleyball, debating, and general knowledge quizzes.

Each school took turns to host, and the trophy was retained by the winning school for the year. The trophy was donated by William Bradshaw in memory of his wife, Helen (née O'Leary-Fay), who was an alumna of the Convent of the Sacred Heart Island Bay in the late 1920s and died in 1973. The trophy is a carved wooden Māori figure on a solid base with an engraved silver shield recording the year and winning school.

After Erskine closed in 1985, the site was home to various creative groups but sadly, over time, the buildings fell into disrepair, became abandoned, and were eventually red-stickered. In 2000, the Erskine site was purchased by developer Ian Cassels of The Wellington Company. There was opposition to Erskine being redeveloped into housing, but the Environment Court ultimately ruled that the school buildings could be demolished but the Chapel must be restored. Erskine alumna and Wellington City Councillor Nicola Young worked closely with The Wellington Company to help save the Chapel.

Significant strengthening work was undertaken on the Chapel, and the roof was fully restored, complete with heritage ochre-red cladding. The intricate details inside the Chapel were then restored, which included significant carpentry, leadlight windows, and Italian Carrara marble.

Erskine Chapel officially reopened on 26 October 2023. Now lovingly returned to its former glory, it sits among an award-winning residential development of 97 homes. Members of the community, stakeholders, alumnae, media, and the project team enjoyed an evening of celebration on



the opening night. Sister Elizabeth Snedden RSCJ, Baradene alumna and former teacher at Erskine College, attended the celebrations. A few days later, on a sunny Wellington day, a public open day and market were held to celebrate the reopening. After visiting the restored Chapel, Erskine alumna Mary-Anne Bourke noted, "You're reminded of what a massive and complex job it must have been to strengthen and restore this very special part of the old school when you see the photos showing the state it had got into through the last couple of decades... This restoration is a gift that has been well worth waiting for, and I wish to add this note of appreciation and sincere thanks to all those involved along the way and to the developer, Ian Cassells of The Wellington Company."

A few words from Nicola Young, Erskine Head Girl 1971 and Wellington City Councillor

"It was emotional to attend the Erskine Chapel reopening, after almost 40 years of neglect. As an alumna (from the age of eight), former Head Girl, and now a Wellington City Councillor, I worked with the owners (The Wellington Company) to gain support for the redevelopment from fellow alumnae and local Island Bay residents, many of whom had never been inside. I helped ensure some of the RSCJ Sisters were commemorated by the street names in the development – Sister Erica Pabst, for example. Then, as the restoration neared completion, I helped with the placement of fixtures, including the Stations of the Cross (although a few are missing), and tracked down a late-1960s recording of the students singing hymns, which was used during the reopening. The restored Chapel is now a popular venue for weddings, funerals, concerts, and other social gatherings."

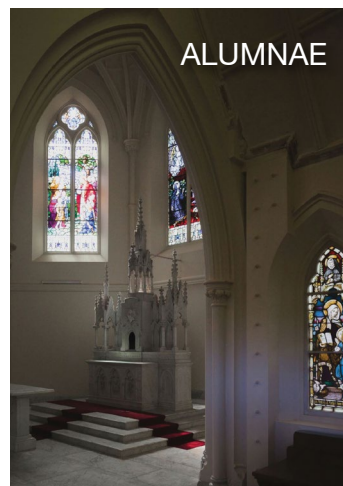

We congratulate two alumnae on their recent appointments as Judges of the High Court of Aotearoa, New Zealand.

MICHELE WILKINSON-SMITH (Class of 1988)



In January 2024, Michele Wilkinson-Smith (née Wilkinson), Crown Solicitor for Whanganui, was appointed a Judge of the High Court.

Michele attended Baradene from Form 1 in 1982 until the end of Form 6 in 1987, before spending Form 7 as a boarder at Woodford House. Michele has many happy memories of her six years at Baradene, with House Parades for the swimming sports a particular highlight.

Michele attended the University of Auckland, graduating with LLB (Hons) in 1993. She commenced practice with law firm Brewer Mazengarb in New Plymouth, becoming a partner of Auld Brewer Mazengarb and McEwen in 1998. Specialising in criminal law, Michele became a barrister sole in 2004, practicing as both a defence barrister in Auckland and a Crown panel prosecutor in Palmerston North. In addition, Michele was a member of the legal aid review panel, a visiting Justice at Whanganui prison, and a member of the Legal Aid Performance Review Committee. Michele was also involved with the Taranaki District Law Society, holding various roles including President, and on the faculty of the New Zealand Law Society Litigation Skills Programme. In 2016 Michele was appointed as the Crown Solicitor

for Whanganui. At this time, she set up legal offices in Whanganui with her husband Chris Wilkinson-Smith, also a lawyer.

During her career, Michele appeared in several high-profile criminal cases and in New Zealand's appellate courts. At her swearing-in, it was noted how unusual it was for a Judge to have had experience with both criminal defence and prosecution work. She was described in media reports as a "distinguished legal professional who brings a wealth of experience to the bench".

LAURA O'GORMAN (Class of 1990)

In October 2023, alumna Laura O'Gorman KC was sworn in as a Judge of the High Court by Chief Justice Helen Winkelmann.

At her swearing-in, Laura was described as a "highly effective litigator who is strongly principled, kind, calm, with a strong sense of morality and social justice."

Laura remembers her Baradene years fondly, and while a student here, she not only excelled academically, becoming Dux in her final year, but also pursued a wide range of cultural and sporting interests. After leaving Baradene she studied at the University of Auckland, graduating with conjoint Law (Hons) and Commerce degrees in 1996. Laura commenced her career at law firm Buddle Findlay, then travelled to the United Kingdom and completed her LLM at the University of Cambridge in 1999. Returning to New Zealand, Laura also returned to Buddle Findlay, becoming a partner in 2005.

Laura joined Bankside Chamber as a barrister sole in 2019 and was appointed QC in June 2021. Prior to joining Bankside Chambers, Laura had been a partner at Buddle Findlay for 14 years. Laura's practice included a broad range of commercial litigation with specialist expertise in insolvency, competition law, judicial review and statutory appeals, conflict of laws, company law, and contractual disputes.



EMILIA WICKSTEAD

It was thrilling to learn late last year that alumna Emilia Wickstead (Class of 2001) had been selected to design the new uniform for Air New Zealand.

Emilia was chosen from a large number of talented New Zealand designers who applied for the coveted role of dressing 5,000 customer-facing Air New Zealand staff. Emilia's design will replace Dame Trelise Cooper's koru patterns, worn since 2011. Previous uniforms have been designed by Zambesi, Nina Ricci, and the House of Dior.

Famous for her tailored and elegant look, Emilia's designs are favoured by royalty, prime ministers, politicians, women of influence, actresses, and celebrities alike. Emilia's design hallmarks are timelessness and effortless femininity, and her silhouettes are precise, architectural, and designed to be flattering. She is known for blending tradition and modernity in pieces which appear simultaneously classic and fresh.

Emilia said that her "key inspiration is the heritage of Aotearoa" and the uniform will be "a real tribute to Māori heritage through the print design." The Air New Zealand project does mark a departure for Emilia in that it is the first time she will be designing menswear. The airline described her designs as creative and unique, yet functional and comfortable, and said that sustainability was a key consideration. Emilia says designing the airline's new uniform is "a true passion project". Her designs will be revealed in late 2024.

In a Newshub article, Emilia remarked, "My approach to the uniform centres around a deep respect for New Zealand's cultural heritage. First and foremost, it is inspired by people. I'm a big believer that clothing can be transformative, uplifting, and empowering, and my hope is that the new uniforms will instil a sense of pride and purpose in Air New Zealand's incredible, world-class team."

Emilia referred to her appointment by Air New Zealand and paid tribute to Baradene and the lifelong friends she made here, writing, "Aotearoa. This year I am particularly grateful for the opportunity to create an even greater connection with my homeland through my work with Air New Zealand. Reflecting back on my early years, one of the greatest gifts I've been given in life is my upbringing in New Zealand. From carefree, barefoot days on the beach to happy memories of friends and mentors at school, Baradene College of the Sacred Heart taught me so much... Where I met my best friends and where we had the time of our lives! Almost three decades on, these were the friends by my side when I arrived in Auckland last month for a special welcome and blessing to celebrate my announcement as Air New Zealand's next uniform designer. From a dream born there moons ago, I couldn't be more thankful, or more excited, to continue the journey into this new year. Me at 13 with a very short hair cut and not a care in the world!"

While Ann stayed on at Baradene, the boys went to Sacred Heart College, then situated in Ponsonby. 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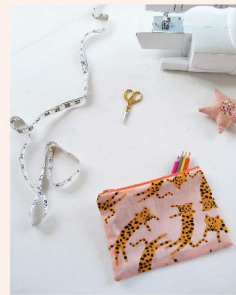
