
As a Baradene student, you will have the delight of putting your all into a job well done - whether it is through the spiritual, academic, cultural or sporting life of our school family.



Baradene College of the Sacred Heart is a Catholic state-integrated school for girls from Year 7 to Year 13. Established on its present site in 1909 by a religious order of French origin, the Society of the Sacred Heart, the College is one of a network of schools which spans 41 countries. Baradene College is the Order's only school in Aotearoa, New Zealand. The school has a maximum roll of 1200 students. In addition there are approximately 55 International Students.

From the earliest days of the Society of the Sacred Heart, diversity has been cherished. We value the richness of Aotearoa's bi-cultural society and we welcome students from many backgrounds from throughout Auckland. Our international students come from many different nations.

MADELEINE SOPHIE BARAT was born in a small French town, Joigny, in 1779. The name Sophie, which means "wisdom" is an appropriate one for a girl who was to lead a world-wide religious Congregation of women who devoted themselves to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Madeleine Sophie was fortunate to be educated by her older brother at a time when most girls did not receive formal education. Her brother became a Jesuit priest. To be near to him, Madeleine Sophie moved to Paris. She rose above many challenges to found the Congregation of the Society of the Sacred Heart. In 1800 she consecrated her life to "making known the revelation of God's love whose source and symbol is the heart of Christ".

The courageous women of the Congregation were an example of Christ's love and compassion. They knew that education could open up a world of possibilities for young women, helping them grow in the love of Christ, think critically, and have influence in their homes and their wider world.

The Congregation set up boarding schools across France, and wherever possible a free school for needy children. Our founding Sisters took the Society of the Sacred Heart across the world, with Rose Philippine Duchesne going to America (and Janet Erskine Stuart visiting New Zealand just before the first World War). Today there are over 4,000 religious in 41 countries. When Madeleine Sophie died on Ascension Day, 25 May 1865, 89 of her schools through 16 countries were flourishing. She was canonised in 1925. The example of Saint Madeleine Sophie inspires us to lead and to serve with resilience, wisdom and loyalty, devoted to the heart of Jesus Christ.



Our faith gives meaning to our lives and is part of everything we do at Baradene College.

The Chapel is a sacred place within the school. In our community girls come to a faith in a loving God in a way that is appropriate to their age. Daily prayer together brings a sense of joy and tranquillity. Reflection and the search for goodness and truth infuse each day.

We are able to encounter the love of Jesus, develop a coherent ethical framework, and shape our lives by an active faith.

The Religious of the Sacred Heart remain a loved and important part of the Baradene community. They take an interest in staff and students, praying for them, contributing to school Liturgies and events, providing hospitality, and working in the Archives.



















The five goals of a Sacred Heart Education underpin all teaching and learning programmes at Baradene College.

All our educators share a responsibility to develop an enquiring "habit of mind" in the student. The ability of the student to become an independent learner is the aim of all our classroom teachers. Students are encouraged to develop a positive mind- set whereby they achieve to their potential.

Our curriculum provides students with a wide range of choice. Not only do we offer the traditional courses, but also subjects such as Coding, Digital Literacy and Mandarin. In recent years, the music programme has seen tremendous success with all students in Years 7 - 8 learning a musical instrument in class.

Although the College recognises that achieving academic excellence is a high priority, other skills such as critical thinking, co-operation and collaboration are developed both inside and outside the classroom. A girl educated at Baradene is one who is highly prepared to live and to work in an increasingly global and technological society.

Our classroom teaching follows the New Zealand Curriculum, which recognises Aotearoa, New Zealand's dual cultural heritage together with the "key competencies or skills," which assist all young people to achieve success in the modern world.

Our students are also encouraged to connect meaningfully with the community around them. They are taught to be resilient, compassionate, tolerant and to embrace diversity.

Mrs Pasley, Principal, comments "students are taught as individuals. We help them achieve understanding - spiritually, academically, physically, creatively and emotionally."

A warm welcome extends to all students as they enter the gates of Baradene College.

Students are enveloped in the secure, supportive community of Baradene College where the spirit of Cor Unum ('One Heart, One Mind in the Heart of Jesus Christ') is revealed in everyday interactions.

BIG SISTER, LITTLE SISTER: We help new Year 7 students to feel confident, included and valued through the Big Sister, Little Sister programme. A buddy system ensures that all new students to the college are supported by their peers as they settle into a new environment. Our International students enjoy the support and friendship provided by the Kiwi Sister programme that promotes inclusiveness through social activities.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE PROGRAMME: Baradene College is part of an international network of Sacred Heart schools. There are more than 140 schools worldwide extending across the globe from Britain, Europe, USA, South America, Asia, Australia and New Zealand.

Belonging to the wider Sacred Heart Network offers our students the unique experience to participate in an exchange with our schools around the globe. It is a superb opportunity to broaden the student's perspective, experience the culture and lifestyle of another country and to build lifelong friendships. While the experience is new, our students have the security and familiarity of our mutual Sacred Heart traditions. Students live with a Sacred Heart family, delight in the generosity of the host family, and then have the opportunity to reciprocate the kindness and introduce the exchange student to New Zealand culture and experiences.

OVERSEAS TRAVEL: Students experience the benefits of world travel through overseas trips associated with the curriculum and extra-curricular activities at the college. It is an opportunity to acquire an appreciation and understanding of other cultures and gain a global perspective. Overseas travel has included a music trip to Europe, language trips to France, Spain, New Caledonia and China, a social science trip to Vietnam and Cambodia and an ICT/Media trip to Silicon Valley and USA Universities.









Saint Madeleine Sophie believed in the importance of service and justice and lived her life listening to the Spirit.

Her kindness, resilience and loyalty remain a strong example for young women of the twenty-first century. Our young women learn that through service they are able to respond to others' hardships and make a difference in today's world. Students gain social awareness, a sense of social justice and awareness of the risk to the world's environment, through studying the issues which face the world community.

Voluntary agencies in our wider community receive enthusiastic support through mufti days, contributions through annual appeals, and funds raised through La Fête. A highlight of our school calendar, La Fête is a festival where students fundraise to help a carefully selected project outside the school. Every year level contributes by organising a stall. The Young Vinnies group also help others through the gift of time, serving groups and individuals in need.


Every person's unique abilities are appreciated and every person is expected to demonstrate leadership, sharing her gifts with a sense of humility and grace.

Saint Madeleine Sophie's vision was that young women would gain influence through their education and use that influence to ensure that leadership had a strong base of spirituality.

We encourage and support all students to experience the benefits sport has to offer, whether it be participation orientated or elite based sport. Student participation in extracurricular activities is an important feature of student life at Baradene, and we encourage all girls to be involved in such activities. Over 70% of our students participate in sport.

The Sports staff, coaches, team managers, parents, community, the executive sports leader and the code captains all devote time, energy and expertise to ensure that students have many exciting options. There are currently over 25 sporting codes available across a range of different grades. Regardless of whether the goal is to win, learn new skills, make friends or just have fun there is definitely something for everyone.

The Performing Arts at Baradene College celebrate creativity, culture and imagination. Through the exploration, creation and performance of dance, drama, music and film we let our imaginations take us everywhere. We examine our cultures, our world and ourselves. Beyond the Classroom - the House community.

Following enrolment, each girl is allocated to one of six Houses for sports and cultural competitions in the school. Sports events and cultural House competitions bring out house loyalties and a rainbow of vibrant colours. House chants fill the air, with an energetic expression of House spirit, teamwork and House history.

AMIENS (red) is the town in France where the first Mother House of the Society of the Sacred Heart was located.

BARAT (white) is named for Saint Madeleine Sophie Barat, the founder of the Society of the Sacred Heart, two hundred years ago.

ERSKINE (yellow) is named for Janet Erskine Stuart, the first educator of the Society of the Sacred Heart to visit New Zealand.

LORETO (green) was named for Loreto Hall, the Catholic teachers college in Remuera, Auckland, founded by Archbishop Liston and directed by the Religious of the Sacred Heart. The college ran from 1950 to 1984.

PHILIPPINE (purple) is named for Saint Rose Philippine Duchesne who took the Society of the Sacred Heart to Indigenous people in America. She was declared a saint in 1988.

STUART (blue) was also named for Janet Erskine Stuart, who lead the English-Irish part of the Society of the Sacred Heart.

During their final week of school, Year 13 students receive the time capsule they made in their first weeks at Baradene College. This included their future goals and aspirations, photographs from their childhood and letters from their loved ones.

This event is a special time to reflect upon the young child that entered the college and an opportunity to recognise that it is a well-rounded young woman that leaves Baradene College.
